London, Sept. 15—The British returned to the attack on the Somme front last night, charging men from all parts of the country are over a sector about six miles long. The war office announced today that they had advanced from 2,000 to here for a meeting of the National Base-

The attack was made along the whole British front over which the heaviest fighting has been in progress recently. The British advanced on the line from Bouleaux Wood, between Coombles and Ginchy, by

southeast of Thiepval and captured about 1,000 yards of German trenches, including a strongly fortified position.

The statement says a large number of prisoners has been taken. "In this attack we employed for time a new type of heavy armored car which proved to be of considerable utility. Much aerial fight, has taken place. Four hostile machines were in flames, and at least four others were driven down damaged. One hostile kite balloon was brought down last night."

ABOARD AND SEASON'S SALMON CATCH IN DANGER

In Breakers Off California Coast-British Steamer Counsellor Foun-

San Francisco, Sept. 15—The Alaska Packers' bark Star of Chile, en route from Bristol Bay, Alaska, with the season's catch of salmon for San Francisco, was reported last night to be in the breakers off Point Pedro, twenty-five miles south of the Golden Gate. On board the vessel more than 200 cannery hands were thought to be returning to this port.

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News of the danger of the vessel was brought here by fishermen who said that she appeared to be in great danger of being swept on the rocks, but that a dense fog set in and hid her from view.

Deep-sea-going tugs were sent from San Francisco When last seen the Star of Chile was three quarters of a mile off shore and her crew was signalling for help.

London, Sept. 15—The captain and crew of the British steamer Counsellow have been landed here. They say the steamer foundered. One member of the crew is an American. The Councillos was of 3,176 tons. She sailed from Colon for Liverpool on August 27 on her way home from Vancouver via San Francisco.

Marshfield, Ore., Sept. 14—Fire tonight completely destroyed the Pacific Coast Company's liner Congress, two miles off Coos Bay Bar. Several vessels, which rushed to her assistance in response to distress calls, helped remove her 258 passengers and crew of 170. No lives were lost. The origin of the fire has not been ascertained.
