WILL FIGHT THE STRIKE TO FINISH

Enemy Influence at Work in Providence Shops

MUNITIONS FOR ALLIES

Workmen Playing Game for Dumb in Delaying of Product—Statement by Brown & Sharp Manufacturing Company

Providence, R. I., Sept. 27.—Henry D. Sharpe, president of the Brown & Sharp Mfg. Co., has issued a long statement in which he stated that the corporation would fight to a finish the strike which was inaugurated by machinists and which has lasted about 40 per cent. of all the companies employes.

"The strikers are making plans for a systematic strike in other machine shops in the city. In his statement, Sharpe reviews the causes behind the strike.

He said in part:

"What does the Brown & Sharp strike mean? Everyone should understand the real inwardness of the movement in which it may be a factor.

"The carefully prepared agitation and the strike itself are incidents in the prosecution of the Dumba campaign to embarrass the manufacturer of ammunition and munition machinery intended to assist the cause of the allies. All of the strikers insofar as their action goes contribute to delay the delivery of machines needed by industries serving the cause of the allies and thereby assist a scheme which was proposed and advocated by Dumba himself.

"We wish all of our present and former employes to know that the company is firm in its decision to continue its regular working schedule in the event of a strike.

"That the regular system of paying the market rate of wages for each kind of labor with every opportunity for job work will be continued.

"That the system of individual and confidential dealing between employer and employe in matters of wage will be continued.

"That the company will continue to operate its business without dealing with labor unions, shop committees or walking delegates.

"That the company will assist any employe in prosecuting to the full extent of the law any person engaging in assault or uttering threat against any of its employes because of the fact of his following his lawful occupation.

"That the fact of the making of engagements to deliver tools will force the company to accede to the union demands, as has been claimed by a union agitator in dealing between employer and employe in matters of wage will be continued.

"That the statement repeatedly made to our employes by union officials that the company would parley with the strike demands or union threats, is a falsehood. It expresses nothing more than the hopes of those who make it, to some of our employes it has been a snare and a delusion.

"That the continued remaining from work will mean not only the continued loss of wage in a hopeless and foolish undertaking but the discharge of the workman himself, a man who refuses to work has no claim to remain on the rolls of the company.

"That a man once discharged will regain his place only on making reapplication in the regular way.

"In conclusion:

"The company will welcome back to work all employes of good will with whom we can co-operate as in past years (Signed)

MONCTON INTERVIEW WITH "BUD" TIPPETT

The Moncton Transcript had an interview with Bud Tippett, from which the following is an extract—

Mr. Tippett, with a handful of men, about forty in all, was firing from the shelter of a hedge a few feet in advance of the remainder of the battalion. A large body of the enemy approached, Major Hanson ordered the forty to retreat across the field to the main hedge, where the rest of the battalion was stationed. Just before this order arrived, Mr. Tippett was shot through the right leg.

He said that the wound caused very little pain, the first intimation of it being a feeling as though someone had touched his leg with a red hot iron. He was able to move about for half an hour afterwards without bleeding excessively or feeling the disability much. Then the order came to retreat across the road. On the way across he was struck in the left arm and fell to the ground. Here his wounds commenced to stiffen, making it impossible to crawl away, as the least movement made the pain excruciating.

After some time he was carried off the field, taken to Boulogne and thence to the British Isles. He spent three weeks in a hospital at Cardiff, Wales, and three more at Ross, in Hertfordshire. Next he was sent to a convalescent home at Monk's Horton.

Speaking of life in the trenches, the soldier said that they could always tell when they were opposed by the degree of conversation which flowed back and forth. The Prussians preserved a silent silence; the Bavarians yelled insulting epithets, while the Saxons talked quite freely across the intervening spaces and frequently claimed kinship with the English.

He was asked about the relative fighting qualities of these men, and whether they relied on bayonet fighting. He said that the Saxons were the most peaceable, the Bavarians are hard fighters, while—"You can bet the Prussian Guard will make a stand anywhere any other troops will."

NO CHANGES IN THE LIST OF SAINTS' DAYS

Proposal at Church of England Synod Voted Down—The Church and the War

Toronto, Sept. 23.—At the Church of England synod meetings yesterday, it was proposed that in the calendar several changes be made in the list of saints' days, resulting in an addition of twenty-one feasts, while fourteen are omitted. Resolution Days, it was proposed, should not be days of fasting, and the number of vigils reduced very considerably, leaving only in the suggested list the Nativity, Easter Day, Ascension and Pentecost.

Rev. H. M. Little of Montreal objected to any change, asking that the table be left as it stands at present on the ground that the observance of fasts and vigils was a matter of individual conscience. He was very strongly supported by Rev. Arthur French, Montreal, a vote of the lower house rejected the suggestion of the committee, consequently the old table will stand in the new prayerbook.

The synod resolved unanimously that a loyal address be sent to the governor-general for transmission to the king. Dr. Patterson-Smith said that of the Canadian troops which have so far gone to the front, more than seventy per cent. are adherents of the Church of England.
