MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Seven thousand Italians raided Henry Bourassa's newspaper office (Le Devoir) last evening. They were dispersed by the police before any serious damage was done. The cause of the raid was an article which appeared in the paper saying that Italy had entered the war on the side of the Allies.

At the Daughters of the Empire convention in Halifax last evening the speakers were Mrs. A. W. McDougall of Montreal and Dr. Fraser Harris of Dalhousie University. The membership of the organization has greatly increased since the outbreak of the war.

Among the passengers on the White Star liner Adriatic, which sailed from New York yesterday for Liverpool, was Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the C. P. R. The steamer had 298 passengers and 18,000 tons of general cargo.

The second trial in connection with the Albert poisoning case commenced yesterday and the case is likely to go to the jury tonight or Saturday. Downing, the accused, was on the stand when the court adjourned last night.
