THE race in the big leagues is assuming all the earmarks of the most bitter struggle in the history of organized baseball, for not only is Cincinnati now tied for first place with the St. Louis Cards and the Pirates snapping at their heels, but in the American League the Yankees dropped to within five and one-half games of Cleveland coupled with the series scheduled to open tomorrow in Cleveland for six games between the league lead-

It is now a race to the end between St. Louis and the Reds, each having 12 games to play. St. Louis plays at Boston today, while the Reds are at Brook lyn. Tomorrow, St. Louis starts a four game series with Philadelphia, while omorrow the Reds still are at the Brooklyn ball yard. On Sept. 16, Cincinnati joins issue with New York in a three-game series. New York teday and tomorrow, and
then moves over to Brooklyn for a four
game series. With the Pirates only
two and one-half games behind, the

NEW YORK, Sept. 14-Cincinnati and St. Louis were thundering down the home stretch neck and neck race, the banner attraction at the big league race track. However, there can be no dead heat in this baseball thriller. Judge Clinton H. Givan, holding that ownership of the much-disputed con-tract represented a property right, granted the petition of the Chicago Coliseum Club for an injunction last night, in spite of the fact that prize

fighting is not sanctioned by Indiana Assertions of B. O. Clements, president of the Coliseum Club, that suit would be entered in Pennsylvania immediately to make the injunction operative in that state, were met by emphatic declarations from Promoter Tex Rickard that he was "going right to the limit to put on the fight as plan-

"Before signing Dempsey, I went thoroughly into the claims of the Chicago Coliseum Club and was convinced that it was without merit," Rickard said at Philadelphia. "The club promised Dempsey a million dollar purse, but did not put up a nickel. It tried
