RECORD IS SET BY HARRIMAN HORSE

Anna Bradford Girl Does Mile Twice in Week Under 2-Minute Mark

Two very interesting and important chapters have been written the last week in the life of great harness horses, Anna Bradford's Girl and Greyworthy, the former having achieved the goal of every owner and every great horse, namely pacing or trotting in two minutes or faster...

Anna Bradford's Girl achieved the honor, taking double measure by beating two minutes in a race at Syracuse, and four days later pacing an exhibition mile at the Indiana State Fair in 1:59.4, a half second better than her race record of 1:59.4, made at Syracuse.

But the curtain has been rung down on Greyworthy as his owner, Sanford Small, of Boston, has pensioned the world's fastest grey trotter by turning him over to Thomas D. Taggart, French Lick Springs, Ind., where he was shipped to be pensioned and cared for as is due a horse of his brilliant career.

The breeding and career of Anna Bradford's Girl is interesting from every angle, the first being that by lowering her record to 1:59.4 in the second heat of the 2:03 pace at Syracuse, September 3, she dethroned the little red horse, John R. Gentry, 2:00 1/4 as the fastest harness performer owned by members of the Harriman family. John R. Gentry long held that distinction, his beautiful appearance and extreme speed, coupled with a rarely fine disposition so endeared him to the family of the late railway master, that he was provisioned with the most comfortable care it was possible to give a horse in the warm climate of Tennessee, until he died, within 30 years.

John R. Gentry was the sire of John R. Braden, famous Presque Isle horse.

TEX GOING ON WITH FIGHT AS PLANNED

Injunction Granted in Indiana—Must Now Secure One in Pennsylvania

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 14—The famous \$100 contract calling for a bout between Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills, negro challenger, has bobbed up again, this time as the basis of a Superior Court injunction to prevent the champion's match with Gene Tunney at Philadelphia, Sept. 23. Judge Clinton H. Givan, holding that ownership of the much-disputed contract represented a property right, granted the petition of the Chicago Coliseum Club for an injunction last night, in spite of the fact that prize fighting is not sanctioned by Indiana law.

Assertions of R. O. Clements, president of the Coliseum Club, that suit would be entered in Pennsylvania immediately to make the injunction operative in that state, were met by emphatic declarations from Promoter Tex Rickard that he was "going right to the limit to put on the fight as planned."

"Before signing Dempsey, I went thoroughly into the claims of the Chicago Coliseum Club and was convinced that it was without merit," Rickard said at Philadelphia. "The club promised Dempsey a million dollar purse but did not put up a nickel. It tried to hold him champion up."

OPINIONS DIFFER. A warm contest of words has developed around the possible effect of an Indiana injunction in Pennsylvania. James A. Farabaugh, Clements' attorney, declared that a federal injunction provision made Pennsylvania's recognition of the Indiana court's mandate compulsory. On the other hand, Rickard and Gene Normie, Dempsey's manager, were convinced that the injunction would have no effect on their plans. Normie pointed out that the right to appeal existed.

The view that Pennsylvania courts would have to take cognizance of the Indiana injunction, was expressed by Judge Givan in a statement after court had adjourned.

"If the Pennsylvania courts follow the injunction, they cannot help but issue a similar, or at least temporary, injunction. No extensive hearing would be conducted in Pennsylvania such as was conducted here."

The injunction proceedings were instituted here when Dempsey stopped off in Indianapolis on his way from Los Angeles to his eastern training camp.

BACK TO GIANTS PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 14—Manager Fletcher of the Philadelphia Nationals has announced that pitcher Jack Bentley has been sold to the New York Giants at the winter price of \$4,000. Bentley came to the Phillies from the Giants at the start of the season with Wayland Dean, in a trade for Jimmy Ring.
