

Summer Causes Much Detail for New Assembly

OTTAWA, Dec. 6 .- In addition to the work of the present session, members of Canada's sixteenth parliament will find awaiting them about seventy bills left over from last session. Of these, 48 are divorce bills, fourteen of which had passed both houses and only required royal assent to make them absolute. The rest were in some stage in the House of Commons, with one or two exceptions, certain of being passed. The unexpected dissolution of the last parliament which prevented completion of this divorce legislation also left in the air a number of important bills. It now apears that these will have to be considered again, one by one before the new parliament can pass them.

TALK OF BLANKET BILL

At one time there was talk of issu-At one time there was talk of issu-ing a blanket bill covering all the leg-islation which had passed both sen-ate of House. By this means it was hoped to dispose of the formidable list of leftover legislation in a very short time. Exactly what will be done has not been decided. But it now ap-pears that some of the bills might prove contentious, in the new house, and it probably will be necessary to
