The commissioner of public works was authorized to purchase one horse, yayment to be from appropriation.



OTTAWA, April 6—In committee of supply tonight the House of Commons voted \$1,500,000 for maintenance and repairs to Dominion steamers and icc-breakers, marine department. There was only a brief and desultory debate on the item, which is the same as last

On a vote of \$20,000 for the examination of the masters and mates, the opposition raised the point of economy. 


