### Whipple-McLeod

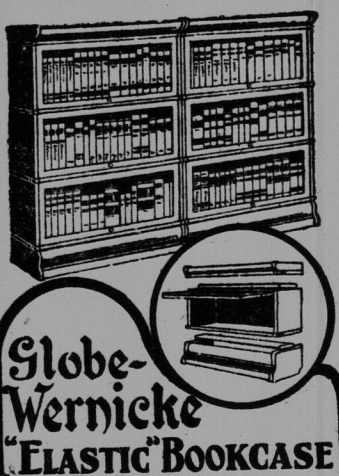

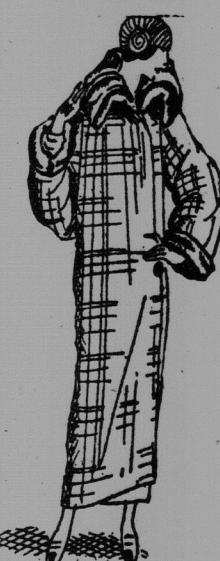
