
CANADA FIGURES IN DEBATE IN CONGRESS

Washington, April 18—The St. Lawrence waterway project received further debate in the Senate today. Senator Calder, Republican, New York, speaking in opposition of the enterprise and Senator Townsend, Republican, Michigan, urging and predicting its completion. Senator Calder denied there was any sectional prejudice in his attitude, but Senator Townsend declared that all of the organized opposition had come from New York state:
