Toronto, April 18—A campaign of public speaking to arouse interest in the functions and aims of the League of Nations is being begun by the Canadian branch of the League of Nations Society. Sir George Foster was in the city today preparatory to making four addresses in the province this week on the work of the league. He spoke at Brantford tonight.

"The campaign," said Sir George, "will be carried on during the spring and summer months of this year. Its immediate objective is the establishment of branches of the society in all possible Canadian cities and towns."

RADIO TELEPHONY FOR THE G. W. V. A.

Ottawa, April 18—Members of the G. W. V. A. dominion and provincial commands have been working for some time on a plan for quicker and better communication between the dominion command, and the provincial units and the larger city organizations and at last the solution has been attained.

The answer is radio telephony. The Dominion G. W. V. A. proposes to install in Ottawa a large sending apparatus capable of reaching Canada from coast to coast.

WELCOME VETERANS

Ottawa, April 18—Predicting a great wave of migration and settlement within the British Empire in the very near future, Field Marshal Earl Haig, president of the British Empire Service League has written to R. B. Maxwell, Dominion president G. W. V. A., outlining a plan whereby a system of reciprocity might be made effective in welcoming and assisting former service men from the old country settling in the dominions.

Steps are being taken to comply with Earl Haig's proposal.

## CANADA FIGURES IN DEBATE IN CONGRESS

Washington, April 18—The St. Lawrence waterway project received further debate in the Senate today. Senator Calder, Republican, New York, speaking in opposition of the enterprise and Senator Townsend, Republican, Michigan, urging and predicting its completion. Senator Calder denied there was any sectional prejudice in his attitude, and reports were received from the various committees showing a considerable amount of work done. F. W. Coombs reported for the financial committee; C. F. Sanford and V. McLellan, for the budget committee; G. Henderson for the quarterly board; P. Leonard for the choir committee; and W. G. Smith for the missionary committee. Addresses were made by Hon. H. A. McKewen, J. Likely and G. Horton. The reports showed the church to be in a prosperous condition.

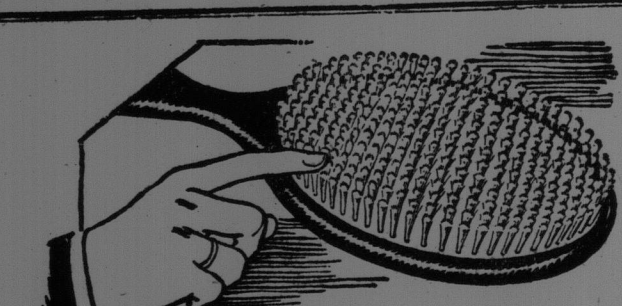

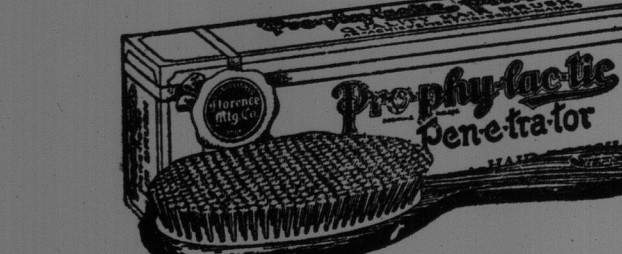

Among the "indiscretions," some of which are serious and some trivial, are listed:

Allowing undue familiarities from men.

Constant week-end engagements and evasion of hours.

Allowing attentions from several different men in one term.

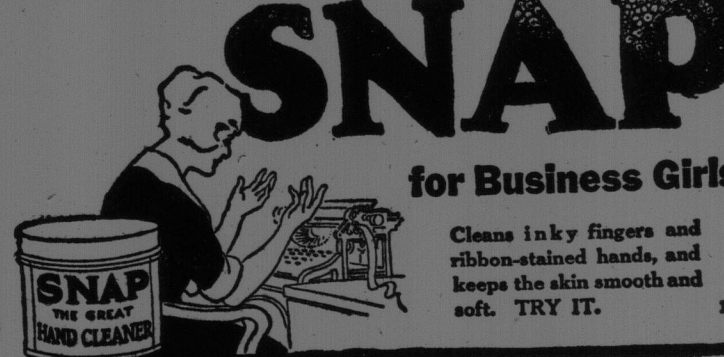
## LOAN FOR GERMANY.
