HOW TO ECONO- MIZE IN COAL

It Seems There is More Than
Price to be Considered.

You buy coal solely to make heat. The more burnable matter, and the less waste or ash in a ton of coal, the more value. Butter a Little Dearer; Three Cent Drop in Price of Veal.

Montreal, March 11.—The warm weather, cheaper feed and the competition of Chinese eggs are combining to drop the price of eggs here. Yesterday they were down four cents from last week, at 54 for new laid and specials at 60. Creamery butter has, however, advanced from 58 cents to 60 cents a pound for first quality and from 55 to 57 cents for second grade.

WIRELESS TELEPHONE BETWEEN BUENOS AIRES AND PARIS

Buenos Aires, Feb. 8. — (Associated Press, by mail). — Wireless telephone communication between Buenos Aires and Paris is a promise of the not distant future. The government has granted a concession to the General Wireless Telegraph Company of Paris to construct on the Argentine coast a powerful radio-telegraph and radio-telephone station to communicate with France and other European countries. The company, it is said, expects to establish telephone connection with Paris by a system of continuous waves of 800 kilowatt power and over.

The duration of the concession is for thirty years. It authorizes the company to carry on experiments in long-distance radio-telephony and if at the end of three years the experiments are considered by the Argentine government satisfactory, the concession will be extended to permit commercial exploitation of wireless telephone as well as telegraph communication. Three plants are to be erected, according to the plans.

London, March 11.—Sir Robert Horne, president of the board of trade, announced yesterday in the house a plan of credits for dominions guaranteeing up to 85 per cent. of the invoice price of the goods on approved security.

WILL TEACH POLICE TO AIM AND SHOOT

Montreal Constables to Receive Instruction in Care and Use of Small Arms.

Colonel Gaudet said the place was being fitted up and a target installed, all for the purpose of training constables in revolver shooting.

"I consider it is of the greatest importance that constables should know how to shoot," said Colonel Gaudet. "This is a part of their training. They will be taught how to hold a revolver, and how to aim."

Higgins Re-appointed.

Montreal, March 11.—After organizing a series of lectures by which the city police are given instructions on how to prepare cases and how to gather and give evidence in the courts, the director of public safety has announced that he was following this up with instructions of another character, to teach the police how to shoot. And as evidence that the target practice will be genuine, Colonel Gaudet said that the city authorities were ordering 10,000 rounds of ammunition.

Some years ago the police indulged in revolver practice in the basement of the city hall, but the plan is now to be revived on a larger scale and in more commodious quarters in the old police gymnasium in the Bonsecours Market. Colonel G. S. Kinnear, who has been connected with the 8th Hussars for the last twenty-five years, has been promoted to the brevet rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the Canadian Militia.
