Howard C. O'Neill, of 71 Williams street, star bowler on the Pratt and Whitney league team, a couple of years ago, returned to his home here last Thursday, after having spent a year in France as pilot in the 15th Aero Squadron helping Uncle Sam pelt the Hun. O'Neill saw action at St. Mihiel, in the Argonne and at Verdun, where he took part in spying the German trenches, with machine gun bullets and dropping bombs.

The doughboy is very modest. He slipped into the city quietly after being discharged at Garden City, N. Y., last Wednesday where he was taken after making the trip over in the America. Due out of his last night by a Post reporter he admitted that he had "just slipped over to take a crack at the Hun."

While flying over the Verdun sector making an inspection of the outlying districts with four other machines a cannofiged Krupp opened up on them and two of the machines, one in front and one at his side were shot down. On another occasion he was forced to land in a field of grain during a gas attack, but he repaired his engine and got away safely.

He enlisted in the United States army early in November, 1917, and was sent to Kelly Field, Texas, for training. In February, 1918, he was sent to England on the liner Celtic, which has since been torpedoed. He joined a flying school and remained for five months in England until the big American drive was launched, when he was sent to the front as a pilot.

MARINE NOTES
The steamer Manchester Division is due in St. John soon from Manchester. The steamer Lanuvium, on transport service, arrived here last night to load with a grain cargo. Steamer Manchester Hero is due here this afternoon. Steamer Mansfield arrived this morning. The schooner Mapleland, chartered for river service, is to load lumber here in a few days. The Minnesota, C. P. O. S., is due in St. John on the 18th. The Grampian, C. P. O. S., is also expected to arrive here about the 18th. The two-masted schooner Mercedes, bound from Parrboro, N. S., for St. Stephen, N. B., with 240 tons of soft coal, lost her rudder off Donalds Point, three miles from Calais, on last Tuesday, an anchor on the rocks, stove a hole in her bottom, turned turtle and filled with water. The Mercedes is of 146 gross tonnage, built in Weymouth, N. S., and owned in Parrboro. Her crew, composed of Capt. John Taylor, Parrboro; Mate C. W. Brewster, Canning, N. S.; Seaman Edwin Anderson and Irving McDonald and Cook Wm. Patterson, all of Parrboro, were rescued. The Bangor-Brewer Shipbuilding Company, operating the so-called Stetson Yard in Brewer, announces that work would begin at once on a four-master of about 2,000 tons deadweight, which will be launched before the closing of the river this fall.
