**CLOSING OF THE P.R.A. WEEK AT SUSSEX; THE GRAND AGGREGATE**

Sussex, N. B., Aug. 15.—The tents are struck and the range is again in quietness and the members of the New Brunswick Provincial Rifle Association who have been here all week taking part in the annual meet have returned to their homes, well satisfied with the results of the competition.

The programme was brought to a close this afternoon with the presentation of the trophies, which took place on the lawn in front of the bungalow. The Prince of Wales cup was presented to Sergt. B. R. Clark, of the 67th regiment, by Major O. R. Arnold, one of the pioneers of rifle shooting in the province. Capt. A. O. Bentley received the McLean cup from the hands of Mrs. G. S. Kincaid, of Sussex, and the presentation of the Ladies' cup was made to Sergt. S. L. Day by Mrs. J. S. Frost, of St. John.

The presentation of the trophy for the county match to the Westmorland-Kent team was made by Major J. S. Frost and the McAvity cup was presented to J. S. Knox, of Sussex, by Capt. J. Manning, R. O.

The grand aggregate medals were presented to the winners by Major J. M. Kincaid, who had the distinction of presenting the first gold medal and first money prize to his son, Major G. S. Kincaid. The Donville cup was also presented by Major J. S. Frost to the winners, Gr. W. R. Campbell, an dthe Association trophy, which was won by Sergt. H. M. Smith with the high score of 101, was presented by H. M. Smith, of the association executive.

The following is the result of the matches shot this afternoon as well as the winners of the grand aggregate and the Robertson championships. The championships are arrived at by the addition of the grand aggregate to the scores made in the Donville and Governor-General's matches. The first place was won this year with 448 points, which is seventeen points better than the score made by the winner last year.

(Maritime Merchant)

There is still no news from Ottawa with regard to what the government have decided to do about the new West India steamship service. The first thing we know the winter will have come and gone and as far as the new service is concerned the country will have nothing to show for it. We do not suppose that Canada directly will be a great sufferer,

for no doubt we shall be able to market most of the things we are likely to market in the West Indies, whether we have passenger ships or not, and as for Canadians who would be likely to visit the West Indies, there are opportunities to take good steamers at New York and elsewhere. One has to live in the West Indies to appreciate what transportation means to a place and as far as the new service is concerned the country will have nothing to show for it. **CEMENT SHORTAGE HALTS SAND POINT WHARF WORK**

The cessation of the wharf work being carried out by Connolly and Charlson at Sand Point which has been shut down for four days, is due to difficulties on the part of the contractors in getting an adequate supply of cement, and six more days may pass before the work is resumed.

The trouble originates in the failure of a Hull firm to ship the weekly amount of cement agreed upon. In the meantime the contractors have ordered cement from a local firm but samples of this must first be tested in Ottawa and a total delay of ten days is expected.

The crib work, which has also been retarded, though not entirely held up, through lack of timber, will probably be in full swing again today, when a large shipment is expected to arrive.
