UNKNOWN MAN KILLED  
BY TRAIN NEAR THE CITY

An unknown man died in the hospital  
early this morning as the result of injuries  
received on the C. P. Railway line at Au-  
roa siding, four miles from St. John. He  
was found with both legs cut off after the  
freight train No. 906 had taken the siding.  
It was supposed he had been stealing  
a ride and fell off. The injured man was  
brought to the city on the suburban train  
and taken to the hospital. He declined to  
give his name, saying that he was not going  
to die. There was nothing in his clothing  
to identify him. He died at 1.30 a.m.

THREE NEW FURNISH LINES  
TO GO ON ST. JOHN ROUTE

(Halifax Recorder)  
Furness, Withy Co. intend to add three  
new freight steamers for their London,  
Halifax fleet. One of these, the "Digby,"  
will be here in December, and the other  
two will be ready for this route some-  
time next September. The route that these ships  
will be put on is the one between Lon-  
don, Halifax, St. John, N. B., calling at  
Halifax both to and from New Brunswick  
port.

The Digby, now in the yards of the Ir-  
vine Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Co., Ltd.,  
of England, will be a ship of 5,100 tons  
capacity, 339 feet long, 50 feet beam, 23  
feet 6 inches moulded, and 23 feet 6 inches  
draft of water. She will have water-tight  
bulkheads. Provision is made for the ac-  
commodation of seventy passengers.

MORNING LOCALS

H. C. Rankine, treasurer of the Prot-  
estant Orphan's Home, acknowledges with  
thanks the receipt from John Boden of  
\$500 from the estate of the late Edward  
Callaghan (formerly of the North End),  
who died in Brooklyn (N. Y.), recently.

There was a slight fire last evening at  
the summer residence of Mrs. MacLennan  
near the golf links. No. 2 chemical and  
No. 4 hose cart responded and the fire  
was extinguished before it became serious.

The inquiry into the affairs of the pol-  
ice department, being conducted by the  
commissioner of public safety, has been  
resumed. Policeman Perry was heard yes-  
terday afternoon and on Monday evening  
ex-Alderman McGoldrick gave evidence.

C. of E. Sunday Schools  
The bi-monthly meeting of the Church  
of England Sunday School Teachers' As-  
sociation was held in the Mission Church  
last night, Rev. G. A. Kahring presided.  
During the evening Rev. G. F. Sevier and  
Rev. Father Conners gave addresses.

Rev. Mr. Kahring announced that Miss  
Louise Howard had won the bishop's prize  
for the highest marks on the Sunday  
school examination, having 19  
points. Miss E. L. Milledge was second  
with 91 points, thus winning the deanery  
prize. Miss E. ranked next in the St. John  
deanery.

Plans for the observance of the two  
days of intercession for Sunday schools  
on October 20 and 21 were discussed. It  
was decided to hold a meeting on Mon-  
day, the 24th, in Trinity church at half  
past ten in the morning for communion  
and in the evening a meeting in Stone  
church commencing at eight o'clock.

BOARD OF HEALTH  
At the monthly meeting of the Board  
of Health yesterday, Doctor Melvin pre-  
sented a report on the new health act and  
the regulations of the provincial board,  
which deal, among other matters, with  
plumbing regulations. The local plumbers  
who were to be present did not turn up.  
Doctor Melvin also reported on the need  
of better facilities at the slaughter houses  
and the matter was referred to the legal  
adviser.
