IRISH PARTIES MAY BE UNITED

Overtures of Peace To Redmond From O'Brien

WRITES TO THE TIMES

Plan he Suggests is to Dissolve Connection Between United Irish League and Board of Erin—Lord Balfour Endorses Universal Peace Movement

(Canadian Press) London, Mar. 21.—Wm. O'Brien, the leader of the Independent Nationalists, in a letter to the Times, makes overtures looking to reconciliation with John E. Redmond, chairman of the Irish parliamentary party.

Mr. O'Brien says that he desires to record his deep gratification at the conciliatory speeches which Mr. Redmond made on St. Patrick's Day, and proceeds to offer the suggestion that they might re-initiate the two Irish parties by dissolving the connection between the United Irish League and the Board of Erin.
