URGES EXCHANGING COLLEGE TEACHERS TO AID CANADIANISM

Dean of McGill Arts Faculty Offers Plan to Foster Wider Spirit of Nationalism—Regrets N. B. Decision on College Federation.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Montreal, March 5—Dr. Gordon J. Laing, dean of the Faculty of Arts at McGill University, addressing the Canadian Club here today, made a plea for interchange of professors between Canadian universities with a view to the creation of a wider spirit of Canadianism rather than local provincialism.

Dr. Laing said his subject had been suggested by a recent meeting of Toronto and educationalists in Montreal, which had discussed and rejected the idea of the establishment of a central educational authority at Ottawa to collect and distribute information regarding educational matters. He attributed the rejection of the idea to sectional and provincial prejudices.

In regard to this spirit of sectionalism he cited the refusal of New Brunswick to join in an amalgamation of all the Maritime Provinces colleges into a university with headquarters at Halifax. He regretted that provincialism had led New Brunswick to reject the idea. He considered that Quebec, Nova Scotia and British Columbia were the most liberal-minded of all the Canadian provinces.

RECONSTRUCTION OF LAW CABINET BEING CONSIDERED

London, March 6—The Government's ill luck in its attempt to find many remedies for its members who were defeated in the general election is compelling Premier Bonar Law to consider partial reconstruction of his ministry, as was forecasted a fortnight ago.
