## WHAT'S DOING IN THE MONEY AND STOCK MARKETS TODAY

### SET NEW MARK IN PRODUCTION OF PIG IRON

Monthly Records Surpassed in March with an Output of 8,521,000 Tons—War Peak was 8,508,000 Tons.

March broke all records for pig iron production in the United States with an output of 8,521,275 tons, or 13,590 tons a day, according to this week's issue of "The Iron Age," which states that October, 1916, the peak month of war time came nearest to this figure with 8,508,440 tons, or 118,189 tons a day. Indications are that a new record was also made at the steel works, according to this authority.

"The ability of the industry," the publication adds, "to go on adding to the list of active works still surprises its leaders. No fewer than eighteen blast furnaces blew in March and but three blew out, making a net gain of fifteen. The 288 furnaces making iron on April 1 were producing at the rate of 115,000 tons a day, against a rate of 110,000 tons a day for 278 furnaces on the first day of March. "At 115,000 tons a day on April 1 pig iron production was at a yearly rate of 42,500,000 tons, estimated at the monthly statistics, at 250,000 tons. The greatest year's output was 39,400,000 tons in 1916. Every blast furnace in the Pittsburgh district is now in operation and the Carnegie Steel Company, out of its total of fifty-nine in western Pennsylvania and Ohio, has fifty-four in blast, or more than at any time since 1918."

Despite record production, "The Iron Trade Review" points out that buying and selling of iron and steel is still a more subdued course, a disposition to act cautiously in extending obligations at this time being apparent among both producers and consumers. The market for pig iron, it is noted, is putting into effect this week 10 to 14 per cent. wage increases. They have raised common labor to 10 cents, the rate of the United States Steel Corporation. "The Iron Trade Review" weekly price composite of fourteen iron and steel products again advanced, now holding at \$46.69, as compared with \$46.55 the previous week, \$42.61 for February and \$39.97 for March, 1922.

There are seven cities in Massachusetts in which 12 to 19 per cent. of children are employed. Yet the average amount of child labor in cities of the Union over 25,000 is six per cent. Only Rhode Island and ten Southern States can make a sadder showing than Massachusetts.

## IRREGULAR AT OPENING TODAY

### Sugars Go Higher in Wall Street—Some Activity on the Montreal Exchange.

New York, April 7.—Week end profit taking and short selling in some of the recent speculative favorites, combined with a resumption of operations and an irregular trend to opening prices for the rise in other quarters, imparted to today's stock market. Sugars continued their advance to higher ground under the leadership of Punta Alegre and Cuban American. Studebaker and Iron Products, Kereses, which advanced 2 1/2 points yesterday, fell back 1 1/2 today. Sinclair and the Pan-American issues also yielded fractionally.

Foreign exchanges were unchanged. Demand sterling was unchanged at 4.86 1/2 and French francs advanced one point to 6.81 cents.

### MONTREAL STOCK EXCHANGE.

Montreal, April 7.—(10:30).—Following the opening of the local stock market. This issue opened at 34, and advanced to 37 1/2 for a gain of 3 1/2 points. The traction group were also active. Brazilian, Detroit and Twin City registered fractional gains. The paper issues were neglected.

### MORNING STOCK LETTER

(McDougall & Cowan)

New York, April 7.—There still seems no change in the character of the market. Stock do not attract a following as yet on advances and rallies always end in a period of dullness. We consequently would buy only on reactions, till the market showed some change in character. We do not think the bull market is over, however, and we finally expect prices to move to new high levels for the year.

The equipment market seems the best of any group. American Locomotive in particular seems well bought. U. S. Rubbers, American Brake and N. Y. Air Brakes. Of steel, U. S. Steel and Gulf are in best position. It is probable that a number of favorable industrial earnings reports will be brought out in the next month, covering the first three months of 1923.

The rubbers, like Kelly Springfield, U. S. Rubbers, and Goodrich, will be higher prices as soon as the market definitely turns. Among the motors, Studebaker, White and Chandler look attractive on set-backs. American Smelting got under way yesterday. Ben Conventry, 110 Wall Street, says that the common will go on \$5 on an annual basis, the stock should rise 30 to 40 points.
