subject: As time passes on, under a constant sys-fem of grain cropping, our lands become exhausted of the natural fertility of all law land, and the want of proper care prac-tised in earlier years in the ma age-ment and applications of barn-yard manura-has resulted in lighter crops to the culti-vator of the soil in Outario as well as in other countries. And since our Great North-West has begun to pour into the markats of the world its immense crops of wheat barley, and oats, which they can produce much cheaper than we can their land being easier to cultivate, and the improved implements of argiculture now possessed by the farmers which are so well adapted to the great plains of the West, together with the special advantages given by the railroads in carrying long dis-tances, makes it necessary for the Ontario farmer to look about him for something else which promises him greater profit than com-peting in grain growing with the cheap lands of the West. The price obtained for the grain grown on lands enriched by commercial fertilizers leaves so small a profit to the farmer that it is doubtfal if ever they will be extensively used. The fattening of cattle for the foreign and home market has been recomended as The fattening of cattle for the forsign and home marks thas been recommended as a means of keeping up the fertility of our farpis, and to a certain extent it does; but to the careful and observing farmer it is very apparent that this system practised for a great number of years will result in re-moving from the farm a large portion of the phosphates contained in the bones and the animal matter so necessary for a crop pro-duction contained in the bodies of the cattle and sheep sold from the farm. Co-operative dairying, if properly conducted, promises to the farmer very good prospects of profitable returns, beside retaining on the farm the phosphates of the bones of animals, and in fact all the advantages in the way of man-ure which beefing does, without the losses. Biggest Spring in the World

The largest and most wonderful spring of fresh water in the world is on the of fresh water in the world is on the Gulf Coast of Florida in Hernando county. The Wekowechee River, a stream large enough to float a small steamboat, is made entirely of water spouted from this gigantic natural well, which is 60 feet in diameter and about 70 or 80 feet deep. Chemists who have analyzed the water say that there is not a trace of organic matter in its composi-tion, and that it is the most pure and fresh of any spring in America. A dime tossed into the spring can be seen lying on the bottom as plainly as it could in a glass of common well water. The steamboat which makes regular excur-sion trips up and down the Wekowechee is often floated into the cavity of the spring, but cannot be made to stay in the centre, as the force of the rising the centre, as the force of the rising water forces it to the sides of the basin. The spring and 2,000 acres of land adjoining belong to two Chicago capitalists, who are making it a pleasure resort.



A Cheap Manure Shed. A Cheap Manure Shed. Many wate much of the value of stable manure by throwing it out of doors to be acted upon by aun and rain. We recently awa a very cheap, sensible method of almost wholly preventing such loss. A board roof, ten fest square, is supported by posts eight dest long above ground, which are connect-ed inside by a wall of planks (or of poles, as the one examined was). Near the post at each end stakes a, a, are set against which one end of the state of the set

A SHED FOR MANURE. planks, etc. This allows the front planks, d, to be removed in filling or loading. It is placed near the stable, pre-ferably so that the manure from the stable can be thrown directly into one corner, where it is forked to the opposite corner in a few days, to prevent to violent fermen-tation. A frequent addition of sods, leaves, and other materials that will decompose, will increase the heap, and improve its value upplying a manure superior to many of the commercial fortilizers, at less cost.
