PROBATE COURT.

In Probate Court today the following matter was taken up.

In the estate of Sarah Corbett. RETAILERS OPPOSE CO-OPERATIVE BILL

Druggists Object to Scheme Now Before the Senate

An Idea Borrowed from England Which It is Felt Would Hurt Retail Trade

A private bill which has recently gone through the House of Commons and is now about to come before the Senate, has aroused opposition among certain merchants in St. John. This bill which is known as the Co-operative Stores Act, is said to be supported by Earl Grey, who has sent the bill to the British capitalists will invest a large sum of money in starting retail stores in many of the more important towns and cities in Canada. All persons will have the privilege of becoming stockholders the shares being of the value of five dollars. All who take stock are to be granted a discount on the goods they purchase; all who subscribe are expected to give their trade to these stores. The management will buy direct from manufacturers and save the wholesale dealers profit. Dividends will be paid as in all joint stock companies. The people, speaking generally, thus obtain supplies at prices lower than are ordinarily paid, and in addition receive shares of the profits.

A few days ago the retail druggists of St. John, one of the few lines of business having a Canadian organization, held a meeting at which this bill was shown and discussed. It was there where the co-operative plan has been properly tried it has become popular, and has appealed particularly to the middle classes. One druggist stated that he had been put out of business in England through this competition, and that he was unable to meet. Another had a somewhat similar experience. It was apparent that a large number of those engaged in retail business would suffer by the establishment of such a chain of stores. The druggists communicated with Toronto seeking further information. They have learned that the bill which has gone through Commons is now being held up by the Senate, and that a committee will today state the retailers' objections to the measure.
