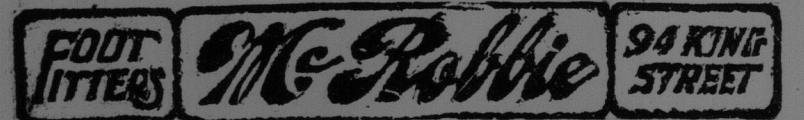

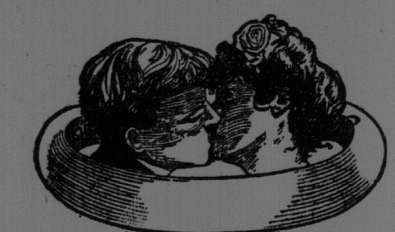

THE "NON-POLITICAL" POLICY OF MR. HAZEN'S PARTY

Albert County Magistrate Dismissed From
Office, the Excuse Being That He
Took Part in Elections.

MONCTON, June 28.—The hypocrisy
of the "non-political" cry with which
Premier Hazen and his supporters can-
vassed the Province previous to the
recent provincial elections is being daily
shown. Perhaps there is no more
glaring specimen of Tory tactics than the
dismissal from office of police magis-
trate Daniel Stuart, of Hopewell
Parish, Albert county. When notice of
Stuart's removal appeared in the Pro-
vincial Gazette, the words "non-political
Cause," were appended. Mr. Stuart
wanted to know the cause and wrote
Premier Hazen in reply he received a
reply over the provincial Tory leader's
signature saying that Mr. Stuart's re-
moval had been decided on recommendation
of members from Albert County, the
cause being no less an offense than
"political partisanship." This is
contained in a letter over J. D. Hazen's
signature, this from the gentleman who
said there was no politics involved in
the provincial campaign.

BODIES OF COUSINS WERE BROUGHT HOME TOGETHER.

Dr. Frank McDonald, of Chicago, and
George McDonald, of Malden, Will
be Buried Tomorrow.

There will be a rather sad gathering
at McDonald's Corner, Queens County,
tomorrow, when the bodies of both Dr.
Henry McDonald and his cousin,
George McDonald, will be buried.
Dr. Henry McDonald was a former
resident of Cambridge, Queens County,
and a son of the well known Queens
County Baptist clergyman, Rev. A. B.
McDonald, who is still living at Mc-
Donald's Corner. Dr. McDonald had an
extensive practice in Chicago. He died
last winter and it was decided not to
remove the body for interment in the
old family burying ground in Queens
County until this week. The remains
arrived in the city today in charge of
J. A. McDonald, who is a St. Louis
newspaper man, the de-
ceased's widow and her mother.

A rare strange coincidence is that
a couple of days ago the late doctor's
cousin, George McDonald, formerly of
Cambridge, Queens County, died at his
home in Malden, Mass., and his re-
mains also arrived in the city today.
He was the son of the late Donald Mc-
Donald, a brother of the Rev. A. B.
McDonald. The remains of the two will
be taken up river on the steamer
Sirocco tomorrow morning and the
funerals will take place Sunday after-
noon at McDonald's Corner.

The late Dr. McDonald has a num-
ber of friends in this city and he paid
a visit here and to his old home about
a year ago.
