MR. PUGSLEY IS UNFIT FOR HIS POSITION.

On the records of the New Brunswick Legislature appears the statement of Mr. Pugsey to the effect that the New Brunswick Coal & Railway Company paid Evans & Elkin \$180,000 for the Central Railway. This money came from the Provincial Treasury. Every dollar expended by that company, which was merely a disorganized department of the Government, was public money.

Mr. Pugsley, a member of the Government which supplied the money, and of the company which received it, allowed the House to understand that the price of the railway was \$180,000. But the Central Railway Commissioners say that Evans & Elkin got only a trifle over.\$140,000. The company declined to pay as much as agreed on the plea that a perfect title to the road could not be supplied. After a good deal of discussion Evans & Elkin decided to accept this partial payment as a full settlement of the account.

Mr. Pugsley was the directing force of the company. It was impossible that he would not be aware of these facts. Yet he told the House of Assembly that \$180,000 had been spent in acquiring the railway. Nearly \$40,000 disappeared. The Commissioners will not say who got it, but they are convinced that it was appropriated by some person or persons in no sense entitled to it.

Mr. Pugsley deliberately misled the House. In other instances he concealed facts of importance from the Legislature. During the time that he was a Provincial Minister his account was continuously overdrawn. Thousands of dollars were in his pocket which should have been in the treasury. He paid no interest on this money. Moreover, the debt never appeared in the Public Accounts, but was carried over from year to year in a Suspense Account. In this way he deceived the Legislature.

Habits such as this are hard to break. The idea that Mr. Pugsley will be a good Federai Minister is surely an extravagant one when his previous career is considered. The Public Works Department spends a great deal of money in the course of a year. Is Mr. Pugsley of the Suspense Account and the Central Railway a suitable man to spend it?

Whatever facts have been gleaned concerning Mr. Pugsley in other spheres of action tend to throw suspicion upon his moral stability and his public spirit. The impression grows that he is a self-seeker whose carelessness in the administration of public money is a matter of general knowledge. Before accusations so grave as those made by the Central Railway Commission a British Minister could not remain in office an hour. If he did not resign of his own motion, his resignation would be demanded by the Prime Minister. This is a British country, and British practice might be adopted here with advantage to the Government
