

THE WEATHER.

Maritime—Decreasing northeasterly to northwesterly winds, local snow flurries, but mostly fair and colder. Toronto, Ont., Jan. 10.—The shallow depression which was off the middle Atlantic coast last night has since developed into quite an important storm which is centred tonight to the southeastward of Sable Island, causing in Nova Scotia northeasterly gales with snow, elsewhere in Canada the weather has been fine and cold.

Sand Point Scene Of Gallant Rescues

George Carvell and Fred Burns Thrown From Scow Yesterday Afternoon, Saved By Crew Of Empress—Boat Lowered And Men Picked Up Exhausted—William Boats Falls 50 Feet From Montcalm—Charles Vincent Again a Hero.

George Carvell and Fred Burns, two Carleton stevedores, had a narrow escape from drowning in Sand Point slip yesterday afternoon. William Boats an Englishman belonging to Montreal, also had a close call from death in the icy waters of the harbor of Sand Point. Messrs. Carvell and Burns were working on a scow of debris along side the Empress of Britain when one of the lines made fast to the scow became tangled with a wire hawser. The scow filled with water and capsized. Both men were washed overboard with the deckload of the scow. They held fast to the drift deals which were being stably carried out of the slip by the tide. Their danger was seen on board the Empress and the sailors lowered one of the large boats from the davits over the side and set out to rescue.

Dastardly Work Of Bold Thieves

Nine Year Old Girl Thrown To Ground And Roughly Handled—John Doyle, Of Westmorland Road, Relieved Of Large Roll While Visiting One Day Last Week—Police Working On The Case.

Two cases of theft reported within the last few days possess somewhat sensational features, and while the amount involved in one is trifling yet the other reveals a mean spirit on the part of the perpetrators, and it is sincerely hoped that they may be brought to justice.

The victim in the more serious case is John Doyle, 111 Westmorland Road, an elderly peddler of barrels, who was relieved of something like \$150, has savings from many a month's hard work driving through town and county collecting barrels and other refuse which he resells at a small profit.

Considerably mystery surrounds the robbery of Mr. Doyle. He has not been in good health for some weeks and had given up his arduous journey on the road and was living on the fruits of his hard labor. One day last week he left his home with \$150 in his pocket and during the afternoon made several calls. He had been drinking and on his return home in the evening found that his money had disappeared.

His recollection of things was rather hazy and about all he could remember was that he had been in a shop in Westmorland Road, conducted by a Mrs. Atkinson. The police were notified the next day, Deputy Jenkinson and Detective Killen paid a visit to the vicinity but as far as could be learned the missing cash has not been located.

Well Known Crooks Hiding In St. John

William Davis And Frank Hironomous Who Escaped From Ohio Penitentiary Being Searched For By Pinkertons—George Capron Absconding Cashier From Chicago Much Wanted—Rewards Offered—Descriptions Of The Men.
