## REPORTS AND DISASTER.

London, Feb. 21—Ship Canara, (Ital.) Ansaldo, from Pensacola Dec. 14 for Genoa, has been towed into Gibraltar leaky.

Pensacola, Feb. 21—Considerable damage was sustained by small shipping in the Pensacola harbor early today, when a sixty mile gale blew over this part of the Gulf coast.

Philadelphia, Feb. 21—Str Gramplan Range (Br.) from Power, has seven of the crew of bark Euphrates (Nor.) before reported abandoned; the balance of the crew were taken off by German Str Chemnitz (as before reported). The Gramplan Range stood by 24 hours trying to get crew off and had to land them by life line. The Chemnitz arrived on scene and took off balance of crew; none lost.

Norfolk, Va., Feb. 23—All of the larger vessels that suffered here in the severe storm of Wednesday night and Thursday had today been floated or otherwise extricated from their threatening situations, except the old Dominion liner Madison, sunk on the coast near Norfolk Channel and the Norwegian steamship Hermes, blown high up on the bar at Edgewater. The Madison has a large hole in her side which must be patched by divers before the steamer can be pumped out. The latter is awash in saloon cabin.

## Shipping Notes.

Up to date 57 winter port steamers have filed their outward at the custom house showing a valuation as follows:—Canadian goods, \$8,528,108; foreign goods, \$6,199,256; total \$14,727,364, which is an increase of \$1,724,367 over last season. The grain shipments in the above 57 sailings amounts to 4,244,237 bushels, and the amount of deals, etc., some forward this season is 18,267,571 feet.

Captain Anderson of the steamship Memomine, which arrived at Boston last Wednesday from Antwerp, reports that on last Tuesday in lat 42 N, lon 64 W, about 256 miles east of Boston light he sighted the deck house and a lot of wreckage. The Captain believes that the wreckage is from some lumber laden vessel wrecked on the passage from the provinces to a southern port.

It is reported from London that the Allan line mail contract with the Canadian government expires in May, and the question of its renewal is now under consideration. It is expected that a pondage basis for postal matter will be adopted, as this would allow all companies to share the benefit as the passage from the provinces to the west.

## Steamship Inishowen Head, Captain Pickford, arrived in port yesterday afternoon from Port Talbot, G. B. In ballast. The steamer was off Port Talbot for some time yesterday in the rough sea waiting for a pilot to bring her into port. She will load for Belfast. A large cargo will go forward this trip.

Four ocean steamships left St. John yesterday, the Royal Mail Empress of Ireland for Liverpool, Pomeranian for Havre and London, Bengore Head for Dublin, and the Rhodesian for the West Indies, all with heavy cargoes.

Yesterday's Weekly Courier says:—Inquiries are being made from parties who have an eye open to the future possibilities of Digby as soon as the development by C. P. R. here becomes a reality, which will be in the near future. The boom now commencing in St. John will have its beneficial effects on this side of the bay. Digby stands in line to reap its full share as this development takes place.

Boston, Feb. 21—On account of the strike among the dock laborers at Buenos Ayres, vessels arriving at that port from Boston are subjected to long delays in landing their cargoes. Vessel owners and consignees have protested in vain. British ship Timandra, which arrived at Buenos Ayres Oct. 29, is now on her way to her cargo of 1,500,000 feet of lumber after being in port nearly four months. The Timandra was ashore on her way up the river to Buenos Ayres and lay there for nearly two weeks. She sustained some damage and will probably have to undergo some repairs before sailing on her return trip to Boston.

A Norfolk, Va., despatch says:—Five steamers have been swept ashore in the outer harbor by the worst storm that has swept the Virginian coast in many years. The blow began Wednesday night and continued unabated Thursday. At 10.20 a. m. two screws were reported by Cape Henry as being blown rapidly to sea through the Virginia Capes. No loss of life so far has been reported. The vessels driven ashore during the night were the Old Dominion liner Madison, which lies between this port and New York; the Norwegian steamer Hermos, from Baltimore; the British steamer Strathallen, loaded for San Francisco; the Danish steamer Nordstern, from Boston; the British steamer Elswick Manor, from Philadelphia.

## THE PROVINCIAL DAIRY SCHOOL

The next session of the New Brunswick dairy school will open on March 19th next, when there will first be a ten days course in butter making both for creamery and home butter makers, with a full course of lectures upon the production and care of milk and cream, covering the selection, testing, care and feeding of dairy cattle as well as the prevention of and remedies for common ailments. Instruction will be given on the care and operation of hand and factory separators and for those who desire it, there will be training in soft cheese making for home dairies.

During this course, to which ladies are especially invited, lectures upon the production and marketing of poultry and eggs will be given by Seth Jones, provincial poultry superintendent. Lectures upon animal and field husbandry will be given by Prof. E. S. Archibald and on veterinary science by Prof. John Stoddard, both of the Nova Scotia agricultural college. This course will close on the 29th of March, and on the second of April a course in cheese making will begin, continuing till April 12th. During both courses instruction in milk testing will be given. It is expected that all those who are intending to operate creameries or cheese factories will attend one or both of these courses. Tuition is free and board can be obtained at reasonable rates.

The staff in addition to the special lectures above mentioned, will consist of C. W. McDougall, superintendent and lecturer; L. C. Dingle, instructor in milk testing and cheese making; George Ramson, instructor on hand separators; Albert Conrad, instructor in butter making. Applications stating which course the applicant desires to take, should be sent to C. W. McDougall, superintendent, Sussex, N. B., from whom all information may be obtained.
