The three English players were successful in the first efforts, Miss Ravenscroft turning in the special prize score of 78, which was the best score. She did the links in 81, which is close to par. The English players excelled in their driving, while their scores were almost without fault. On the green the work of the trio was nearly perfect although one or two putts were missed.

Mrs. Barlow, majority of the American title, at times played brilliant golf, while at other times she showed signs of nervousness through not being familiar with the course. Miss Nesbitt, of Woodstock, played the strongest game. She turned in a card of 88, which was with several of Miss Ravenscroft's score. This card placed her fourth on the list of those who qualified. CONSCRIPTION IN SONORA.

Cananea, Sonora, Sept. 29.—Constitutionalists throughout Sonora have begun a concerted effort to increase the number of state troops for the fall campaign against the federalists. Many parties of soldiers, headed by captains, have been sent to different parts of the state, for the purpose of conscription.

Arms and ammunition in the possession of civilians are being confiscated. So far Americans and other foreigners are not being forced to surrender their arms, but those who wish to do so are permitted to exchange them for quivers, bows and arrows of the Mayo Indians, 500 of whom recently joined the state troops.

Millions of Tea-Pots are put into daily requisition, to infuse delicious

Several hundred crates of tea, as a result of the visit of Post Office Inspector Colter a few weeks ago, tenders are now called for a second rural free delivery route. The tenders close on Friday, November 7. The new route will be known as the Hartland rural mail route No. 4, or the Ashland route, and the trip is to be made at the rate of four miles per hour, seven miles each way.

The route in the north-south direction is described as follows:—To leave the residence of Guy McCollum every Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday at 12:30 noon and travel via the Ashland post office and road to the Pole Hill road, thence via the Pole Hill road and the Prays road to the residence of Guy McCollum, and return via the Ashland post office and road to Hartland post office, returning with mail after arrival of mail train No. 151 from Acadam and travel over same road and deliver mail en route.

A guarantee of \$500 is to be furnished by the successful bidder.

The new second free delivery will be inaugurated on Wednesday. Most of the boxes have been placed and the people along the route look forward to a service superior to that which existed heretofore.
