

### TRUCE TERMS ACCEPTED BY TWO PARTIES

#### Sinn Fein and Crown Agree to Suspend All Military Operations.

### DE VALERA WARNS THE IRISH PEOPLE

#### Past History of the Island, He Says, a Lesson Against Undue Hopefulness.

Thirdly, that all provisions of the truce apply to the martial law areas as for the rest of Ireland.

Fourthly, that there be no pursuit of Irish officers and men or search for war material and military stores.

Fifthly, that there be no secret suggestions, descriptions or movements of any kind, and no interference with the movements of Irish military men and civilians and no attempt to discover the haunts and habits of Irish officers and men.

Sixthly, that there be no search for or observation of lines of communication.

Seventhly, that there be no search for messengers.

Other details connected with court martial, motor permits and similar matters, says the Irish Bulletin are to be agreed to later.

### Republican Agreement.

On behalf of the Irish Republican Army "it was agreed that:

"Firstly, that attacks on crown forces and civilians cease.

"Secondly, that there be no provocative displays of forces armed or unarmed.

"Thirdly, that there be no interference with government or private property.

"Fourthly, the discontinuance and prevention of any action likely to cause disturbance of the peace, and which might necessitate military intervention."

### Young Thieves Were Arrested

### Robbed Miss Carroll's Candy Shop on Garden Street and Walked Into Detective.

Two young thieves, aged ten and eleven, walked right into the waiting arms of Detective Donahue after gaining access to Miss Carroll's candy shop on Garden Hill yesterday.

### Good Racing Is Promised Woodstock

Woodstock, N. B., July 9.—More than 100 horses are already booked at Connell Park for the third meeting of the Maine and New Brunswick harness racing circuit which will open here on Tuesday.

The number of horses is the largest ever assembled for summer racing in the Maritime Provinces and taxes the capacity of the accommodations at the Purser track. At Standish, on the American Horse Breeder staff, who will make his first appearance as starter on the circuit here, is evidently to have some big horses to handle and one or more of the classes will probably have to be raced in two divisions.

Calgary Earl, 2:03 1/4, and John R. Bruden, 2:02 1/4, the Arrostook free-freelers, will clash for the first time here, an arrangement under which they will meet in a \$1,000 race on Thursday, the closing day of the meeting, having been reached.

### SHIPS' MARRIAGE ESCAPE

New York, July 10.—Twenty-eight days after a bang hole had been stove in her starboard bow when she struck an iceberg a little Grand Banks, N.M., the three-masted Danish bark Astor made port with a patch of wood and cement hastily rigged on, as placing the vessel in danger.

Mariners regard the feat of the crew, commanded by Captain A. Skov, as a marvellous triumph. Many a larger vessel, they said, had gone down from a less serious wound suffered in the same manner.

### Forest Fires Reported Quiet

Washed fire fighters, at Lake Wood, Frogpond Hillside, Prince of Wales and Miquash reported a state of quiet on every sector of the fire belt surrounding the city.

At Lakewood the blaze has gradually worked its way through the woods to Frogpond and Golden Grove but its advance has been a slow one and its havoc has largely been confined to underbrush. For the most part it has ceased to attack the green wood and is merely smouldering on those tracts over which it has already passed. A keen look-out is being kept on its outskirts so that effective means may be taken to check any outbreaks that may arise.

The same state of affairs prevails in all the other sections which have been visited by the fire fiond. The fire which is headed by a railway locomotive at Prince of Wales, swept through some seventy-five acres of underbrush, and eventually burned itself out without doing much damage. The fire which extended from back of Hillside and Westfield on the St. John River to within seven miles of Prince of Wales on the Shore Line, was reported quiet yesterday. It has not extended to any new areas, but may still be seen burning here and there in the region it has already covered, which is estimated to be in the vicinity of 1200 acres.

### Fire Trap Was Cause of Alarm

### Old Building on Corner of St. Andrews and Carmarthen Streets Damaged Last Night

About 11:40 o'clock last night an alarm was run from box 136, the blaze being in the rear of T. H. Brown's store, which is located at the corner of St. Andrews and Carmarthen streets. From the dense smoke it was at first thought that there was a big fire, but upon investigation it was found that it was caused by hot ashes catching in some refuse and spreading to the walls and floors of the building. Mrs. L. N. Fullert, who is another tenant in the house, smelled smoke, and upon opening a back door the smoke came in such great clouds that she had difficulty in getting the children and herself out of the building. After an hour's fighting the blaze was confined to the old building, and all precautions were taken to make sure of the work. The property, a three-story house, belongs to the T. L. Burke estate, and was built in 1888 in one week, and is referred to as the "Swedish House." Most of the house is boarded up and in very bad condition, and is considered a menace and fire-trap for the surrounding houses. No damage was done, except by smoke, the blaze being confined to the unoccupied part of the house in which tons of ashes have been piled and which seems to have been a haven for "rats and cats" whose beds, made of sawdust and hay, are found in rooms in the far end of the building.
