FREDERICTON.

Fredericton, Nov. 29.—(Special)—Speaking of reading at St. Dunstan's Catholic church this morning, Rev. Father Carney referred to the reading of papers. He said in part that the Catholic reading public needed good Catholic papers.

In reference to the daily press he said that while giving them due credit he thought they gave too much prominence to divorce court news, obituary notices and other scandals, which young people especially, had better not read.

The secular press of this province had at all times dealt most fairly with Catholic church matters, but what the Catholic public wanted was an organ of its own. It was true that heretofore we have had several excellent Catholic papers from other provinces and across the border, but while they gave Catholic news and instructions they did not deal with local or national matters and institutions.

The Rev. gentleman was pleased to see that the diocese of St. John had had for the last few years had a Catholic paper which was a credit to its promoters, and it only wanted practical assistance from Catholics here. He said he referred to the New Freeman of St. John which he would like to see in every Catholic home.

A Chinaman named Fred Wah, who recently became converted to Christianity, was baptized by Rev. J. H. MacDonald at the Baptist church in this evening, in the presence of a large congregation. In the course of the sermon the preacher referred to the converts in evangelistic terms, and gave an entertaining account of his rescue from heathenism.

The students of the university attended divine service in a body at the Cathedral this evening, and listened to an able and appropriate sermon from Dean Partridge. There is considerable excitement at the university over the fact that the Rev. J. H. MacDonald, who has been in charge of the mission at this time, has been elected to the position of rector of the cathedral.
