DRURY ANNOUNCES CABINET RANEY ATTORNEY-GENERAL

Farmer-Labor Cabinet Ready to Take Charge of Provincial Affairs.

TORONTO, Nov. 13.—Premier F. C. Drury, at noon to-day, announced the personnel of Ontario's first Coalition government, and the first administration to take charge of the affairs of this province not composed of members of either of the recognized traditional political parties, the Liberals or Conservatives.

Shortly after 12 o'clock R. H. Grant, F. C. Biggs, Beniah Bowman, H. C. Nixon and Manning Doherty arrived at the Premier's quarters, 10 Adelaide St., East, awaiting their chief. At 12:30 Mr. Drury arrived.

"This is my first appearance to-day," stated Mr. Drury. "I conferred with W. F. Raney until after midnight last night. He stated that he could not see his way clear to wind up his business to take the Attorney-Generalship. W. F. Raney, K.C., has been chosen for the post."

A full session of the new cabinet has been called for this afternoon at the Premier's office. It will be the first meeting of all the ministers and the last one before they take office to-morrow.

Mr. Raney's visit while here is being enjoyed by his two sons, Major "Billy" Raney, perhaps the youngest major in Canada, and Flight-Commander Douglas Raney, who enlisted a year younger than his brother when he was 17.

He emphasized that his own refusal was purely in connection with personal affairs, not because he feared that the new government would have a transient career. The same reasons that prevented his continuing in the federal arena were operative still.

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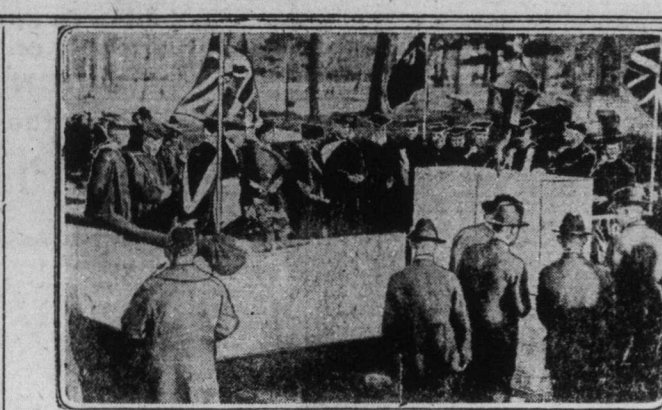

GOVIN TO RETIRE PREMIERSHIP GOES TO FARMER

Quebec Legislature Meets December 10th.—Gouin Will Retire After Session.

QUEBEC, Nov. 13.—The Provincial Government will call the House in session for Dec. 10th next. Sir Lomer Gouin will remain at the head of the Government during the coming session, but shortly after prorogation will abandon politics and leave for Europe to travel for a few months.

Sir Lomer Gouin intended to leave the helm before the session opened; the idea was to give the premiership to the Hon. Joseph E. Robitaille, a present Minister of Agriculture.

The prominence recently attained by the United Farmers in Canadian politics and the possibility of an identical move on the part of Quebec farmers, has raised the hope that, with Hon. J. Ed. Caron, a practical farmer at the head of the Provincial Cabinet, things could be arranged satisfactorily for both Farmers and Liberals at large.

NEW YORK STOCKS SHOW HEAVIEST DECLINE IN YEARS

General Motors Selling Last Week at 400 Drop to 280.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Under pressure from the federal reserve board and other powerful financial interests, Wall Street has adopted more vigorous measures to put its house in order.

This was accomplished by severe losses on a turnover of more than 2,500,000 shares, the year's record—and an advance in call loans to 30 percent—a rate unparalleled since the panic of 1907.

In the course of the decline, speculative favorites registered losses of 10 to 25 points, their minimum quotations being 30 to 60 points below maximums of the last fortnight.

General Motors, which recently achieved the distinction of selling at a higher price than any other stock on the list, was again under persistent pressure, dropping 68½ points to 280 or a loss of 126½ points from its high record of last week.

The reaction encompassed every variety of stock issue.

END OF MANITOBA DROUTH

Winnipeg, Nov. 13.—As soon as peace is officially signed, importation of liquor into Manitoba from Ontario, Quebec, or other provinces will be legal, J. N. MacLean, Administrator of the Manitoba Temperance Act, announced last night.
