UNB has one of only four Forestry Faculties in Canada. Our computing center is the most versatile in the Maritimes, and our degree level in this subject, with both Bachelor and Master's degrees, the most extensive in this region,

"But UNB has never tried to isolate itself to our province. We have taken on as many students from outside the province as the government will give us grants for."

Upon being asked if he wished to add anything more concerning his years as President, Dineen laughed. "There are quite a few things I would like to add, but feel it would not be appropriate. May I just quote John Phinney the chief Engineer of the Power Commission, some 20 years ago, for whom I did some work. He used to say "Most of my problems concern people." People are funny. However it was quite an experience and a real education.'

The 1972 annual conference of the Canadian Union of Graduate Students (CUGS) took place in Toronto on October 30, 31st. The conference was attended by
