The Church lost a devoted mem-
ber in the recent death of Miss Anne
Green, of Harlem, Leeds County,
Ontario, at the age of seventy-one
years. Miss Green was born at Har-
lem and lived her whole life at Har-

centre of strong Church influence and

and. She was a generous contri-
butor to the Forward Movement and
