Reveal Conditions in Germany as They are To-day—Bad and Growing Rapidly Worse

With the British Armies in the Field, Tuesday, Sept. 12—(By Philip Kings)—It is extraordinarily difficult to know whether all the British shell fire and all the dead have yet begun to shake the confidence of the Germans in the strength of their war machine.

That is different from the old phrase: "We are winning. Victory is certain for Germany," and it is a long way from the acknowledgement of defeat or possible defeat. There are times when the pessimists among us are tempted to think that the Germans have mysterious reserves of strength from which they can heal their wounds, and that the success gained is only local and has not yet injured the German war machine in any vital part or struck a blow which has reached to the heart of the German people.

The cure for such pessimism is found in letters captured in the German dugouts on the German prisoners. They draw the veil aside and tell the naked truth. Through all these letters, written by men whose sons are fighting or dead, and by comrades in arms, not hiding their thoughts from each other, there is a cry against the bloodshed and misery of this war, and for peace at all cost.

"By now the town of Offenbach has five thousand widows, and besides that there are the unmarried men who have fallen."

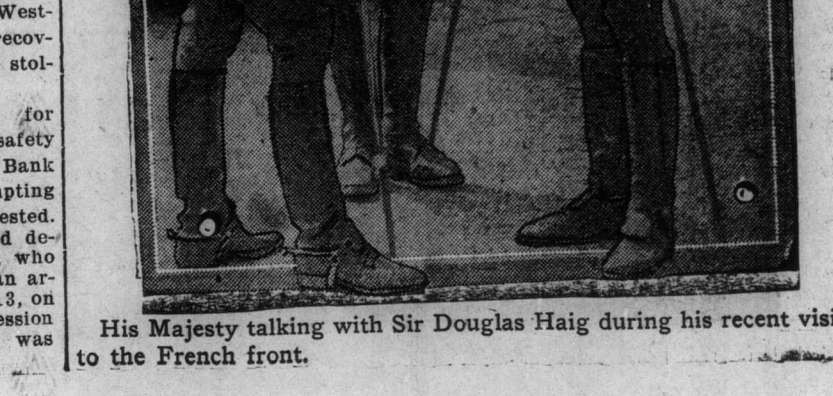
CONSTANTINOPLE TO BE RUSSIA'S?
