The Test Matches

The second of the series of the test matches between England and the South Africans was played at Leeds last week. England for the seventh time in test matches won the toss, and the game by 53 wickets.

Notts vs Gloucester

Nottingham still leads in the race for the English cricket championship. With nine victories and three draws to their credit, they have not lost a game. Playing against Gloucester at Trent Bridge, they were lucky to have an excellent pitch, for once the effect of the roller had worn off, runs were a premium. Jessop made a plucky try to save defeat, but was not well supported. Score: Notts 322, Gloucestershire 160 124.

Derby vs Northampton

Derbyshire have at last won their first game of the season. Playing at home they defeated Northampton by 74. If A. E. Lawton is able to continue playing for the team they will be able to beat the world's best before the season is over. When they started their innings, Lawton had scored 112 not out. 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Winnipeg Wheat Market Erratic
WINNIEPEG, Aug. 14.—The market was just about as jumpy and erratic as it was on Tuesday. There is no improvement in the strike situation and no news came through New York.

The feature of the Winnipeg market was the heavy export trade; some 25 loads were worked. These were sold on direct cable from Liverpool through Montreal. Outside of the exports' business trading was light.

The advance of the morning was 1/4 for September and October and 1/2 for December. All the European markets were up, and American markets opened at Tuesday's close to a fraction higher. Chicago advanced steadily through the early part of the session, closing 1/4 to 1/2 higher than Tuesday.

In a match played at Bloomington the Cornish beat a team representing the Orange River colony by three wickets to one.

Considerable progress is being made in organizing the team of Rugby players which it is proposed to send to New Zealand next spring. G. H. Hart has enough promise to complete the party, but the catch, Irish and Welsh unions are so desirous of having him that they are making it difficult for him to leave his home.

There must have been heavy liquidation in that option.

December closed unchanged and May 1/2 higher. The weather news was generally unfavorable, but there was an increase in the visible of 4,900,000 bushels, against a decrease of 787,000 last year.

It is probable that this exceptional large increase was due in some measure to something being overlooked last week, but in Europe and afloat there was an increase of over one million.

Foreign Markets
Liverpool—Wheat opened unchanged and closed 1/4 to 1/2 higher. Paris—Wheat closed 1/4 to 1/2 higher.

Berlin—Wheat closed 1/4 higher. Oats were 1/4 to 1/2 to one cent higher.

Chicago Markets Strong
CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—Firm cables and a brisk demand from exporters for American wheat caused strength today in the local market. The September delivery closing at a net gain of 1/4 cents. Oats were 1/4 to one cent higher.

The wheat market was firm all day on the buying by shorts and commission houses. Indications that foreigners have been buying considerable quantities of wheat during the last few days was chiefly responsible for the bullish tone.

There was talk of a large quantity of wheat being worked for export from here today, and it was reported that more than sixty boat loads had been taken at the seaboard.

Advances of 1/4 to 1/2 at the principal European grain centres also contributed to the strength in the local market.

The market lost some firmness during the latter part of the day on an increase of 4,949,000 bushels in the world's visible supply.

The failure of a large manufacturing concern also had a depressing effect.

The market closed steady.

September opened unchanged to 1/4 higher at 84 1/2 to 85 1/2, advanced to 85 1/2 and closed at 85 1/2.

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
