A dozen Chilkats were in jail at Skagway several days last summer for destro ing a fish trap and other property belonging to a white man. Among peo familiar with their treacherous habits it is not considered sate for white men to venture up the Chilkat river even on the most peaceful pursuits, unless they go in numbers of not less than from five to eight or more. The missionary and teacher at Haines Mission, Rev. Warren, has no influence over his flock for the reason that they claim to have taken him in the act of selling government supplies to a local mer-chant and of pocketing the money received. As the minister was never able to square himself, an investigating ficer was ordered to Haines Mission by the government, but with what results the writer is not informed. Bu it is possible that the Chilkats think all white men are like their "tender shepherd" and therefore not entitled to longer encumber the earth. -ED. )
