GOOD ADVICE TO FARMERS

At the East Kent Farmers' Institute, which lately met in Ridgetown, Mr. Anson Grob, of Petrolea, gave an able and intelligent address on the raising of bacon hogs, an issue of great interest by the conferences held between farmers and packers. Mr. Grob did not think the farmers were faring so badly, as he figured out that after allowing the highest price for all the feed given to hogs, the breeder realized a profit of 33 per cent. on his sales for the year. While there is a chasm between the producer and packer to be bridged, nevertheless there is a good thing in the trade if the proper stock is produced. The speaker advised the farmers to consider well what they were doing before driving some of the packers out of business, as the more packers, the keener competition, and the better for the farmer. Some years ago grain was down in price and as a result farmers commenced to feed it with the result that the price was forced up and still many farmers continue to red their surplus grain, sa they find the raising of stock gives them back the fertility of the soil, which must be kept up to allow the farm to be run successfully. Mr. Grob gave the tillers of the soil the very sensible advice to form farmers' associations and meet every month or two months to talk matters over. By intelligent and earnest co-operation of this kind there would be less misunderstanding .- Free Press.

### DISSOLVED BY FORCE.

Exciting Scenes In Hungarian Parlia ment, Which Coalitionists Claim Is a Victory.

Buda-Pesth, Hungary, Feb. 20.—The Hungarian Parliament was dissolved yesterday morning by force.

The session opened at 10 o'clock sharp. The vice-president read letters from Gen. Nyirl, the royal commissioner, and Herr Justh, president of the lower House, and declared that the royal rescript dissolving Parliament royal rescript dissolving Parliament forwarded by Gen. Nyiri, was unconsti-tutional and illegal. The vice-president proposed that the House ignore the rescript and return it to the EmperorKing. The House unanimously accepted the proposal with prolonged cheers.
Thereafter the minutes of the meeting
were adopted, the deputies were notified
to reassemble on Wednesday and then
the House adjourned. The royal rescript dissolving Parliament research. script dissolving Parliament was left

script dissolving Parliament was left lying unopened on the president's desk, and the members left the House singing the Kossuth Hymn.

Soldiers Drove Them Out.

The floor was almost cleared when a captain of Hungarian militia, at the head of five soldiers with fixed bayonets and a large number of policemen, who had previously entered by a side door, entered the House. The captain and the soldiers mounted the president's tribune, and the policemen occupied the floor. The captain then opened dent's tribune, and the policemen occupled the floor. The captain then opened
and read the reseript amid constant interruptions from the galleries, and some
of the deputies who returned to the
floor and all present united in singing
the Kossuth Hymn, with the result that
not a word of the rescript could be
heard.
