If men can's succeed where living is cheaper, where labour is cheaper, where a fair protection is given, and where there is an average profit of 25 per cent, then it was too much to ask us to keep there is an average profit of 25 per cent, then it was too much to ask us to keep these unaugoessful concerns going by incordinate protection. But even the manufacturers themselves are not all in favor of it. Mr. D. McClrae, of this town, when examined before the Depression Trade Committee last apring in regard to the woollen trade, said they did not want protection, all they wanted was a fair field and no favour. (Hear and cheers.) In the article of bosts and shoes, they did not want protection, all they wanted was a fair field and no favour, and the sole cause of the depression in that branch was because of over production. So it would be in all branches if protection was the rule. There would be a rush of capital and labour, and over production would be the inevitable result. Were a tariff wall like this to be raised, the markets would soon get completely glutted, and the best interests of the people would be sacrificed. The truth of this was established by the result in the States, where the papers teemed with notices of the failure of woollen mills, paper mills, &c. And the consumer would not only suffer, but our shipping 'trade would languish. He then at considerable length discussed the question of protection as applied to farmers, and was surprised that any one would advocate it, for it simply meant more taxation, or as Mr. Henry Strange the other night at Rockwood said it was a big humbug.
