

Under the above title and in co the Alexander Hamilton Institute of New York, Mr. E. W. Beatty, Pres dent of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has contributed a little pam-phlet known as Lecture No. 24. Based upon the author's ripe experence, it is an authoritative message from his special field of business activity and under various heads, deals with man's struggle with nature; the personal element in business; the pi-oneer spirit; can a government unlertaking be a business success? etc.
In view of the author's prominent

osition throughout the business and railway world and his rapid and early attainment of the presidency of the Canadian Pacific Railway, his message is of more than unssual interest at this time of general depression. It will be read and studied by hundreds of students enrolled in the Hamilton Institute and serve as an exhortation and example to them in their future struggles for advancement and success in whatever they may have chosen.

Nature," he says—
"Self-preservation is not only the first law of nature; it is the first law of business. Every man struggies to maintain his own for himself and for his family, and all his acts are dictated by that effort. The forms of struggle are held in check by the civilization we enjoy, but the struggle is there. The second law is to hold our own, to better our position, to strengthen our grip on all that makes life worth living, Each one workking stead(astly in his own interest not only adds to his own welfare but improves mankind." progress." Regarding "Interference of the State as a Regulating Factor in the World of Business"-

"The Exercise of State interference can be just as excessive as business enterprise. It is, as it were, a corrective medicine. Now medicine may metimes be good for a man. It does not however, follow that in order to be well we should feed on pills."

Replying to the querry "Can a Gov rament Undertaking be a Busines Success?" he writes-

"A private enterprise, even when perating a public utility, like a railhas the stimulus of profit to spul it to a fruitful activity, but if profits fail and losses occur through misfortune or mismanagement, it must bear its own burdens. It is generally be lieved by business men that no under taking run by government can stand the full test of profit making and proper conservation of the plant. Reports of profits from operations generally overlook depreciation, reserves, interest on capital and an allowance for the equivalent of the taxes paid by private undertakings. Fraum a strict accounting view, most, if not all government business undertakings oper ate at a loss and would be wiped out were it not for the direct and indirect support of the public treasury. There may be circumstances in which such operation at a loss is justified by public interests, but it is hard for a business man to conceive of such a sys-tem being generalized without being reminded that the inhabitants of a certain island made a living by taking in one another's washing." Remedy for the Ills of Business."-How manyan filness is due to setfish excess. How often the decay of a once powerful company is due to its abuse of privilege and disregard of the interests and opinion of the community it ought to serve. The company or business enterprise that lives for itself and is not conducted ultimately with an eye to its usefulness to the community is an unhealthy business and a source of instability. It incorporates a wrong ideal of conduc and, sooner or later, is bound to com in conflict with public opinion, to its own ultimate ruin. That business which desires a good old age must be conducted in a spirit of service vice to the community, and service the better if it is virile and progressive, full of initiative and new ideas free from red tape, official rules, castfrom precedents and regulations, but it ought always to be condificted in the spirit of good citizenship."

the early days read: "Parisian Politeness on the C.P.R." This was merely a vivid expression of the cardinal policy of the men who established the company that courtesy and consideration for the people of Canada were to be the watchwords of this private enterprise. These mer were all imbued with an intense patriotism and belief in Canada, and considered that in building up their railway they were building up their country.
