ARMAND GIRL WAS KILLED IN TORONTO

Wilma London Met Instant Death in
Elevator Shaft—Remains Brought
Here Yesterday

Mrs. Henry London of Armand on
Monday received the shocking news
of the instant death of her daughter
Wilma who was an employee in the big
Eaton Store in Toronto. The tragedy
occurred on Saturday when the young
girl was caught in an elevator shaft
and instantly crushed to death.

Wilma London, who was only 16
years of age, about ten months ago
went with her sister Alva, aged 20, to
visit their sister, Mrs. Harold Britton,
who lives in Toronto. The three of
them took work in the Eaton Store and
all were together when the terrible ac-
cident happened.

The reason of the unfortunate
young woman were brought here yes-
terday and were accompanied by Mr.
and Mrs. Harold Britton, Miss Alva
London and Dr. Lewis and Mr.
Alward of the T. Eaton staff. The fun-
eral services at Armand church this
afternoon conducted by Rev. H. V.
Bradford.

Needless to say the shocking occur-
rence has filled with sorrow the com-
munities where the young girl was
known, and much sympathy is felt for
the bereaved relatives.

It is said that the Eaton manage-
ment did everything possible for the
comfort of the bereft ones and bore
every expense. A service was held in
Toronto and a profusion of flowers,
tokens from the firm and employees,
accompanied the remains.

Besides her parents the deceased is
survived by four brothers, Murray,
Alison, Arnold and Ivan, and by three
sisters, Mrs. Willie Kimball, Mrs. Har-
old Britton and Miss Alva.

THE MARKETS

The outlook for potatoes is not at
all encouraging. Late statistics fur-
nished The Observer from a reliable
source show that throughout the con-
tinent there is an immense supply of
potatoes as compared with last year.
In the northern states stocks in sight
are much greater than was shown by
the October estimate. For this reason
American prices are flat. Another
factor that will keep potatoes down is
so much unemployment in the United
States. The price at Hartland to-
day is \$2.75.

There is a large surplus of oats
throughout the country and the local
price today is 65 cents. Hay shows a
sympathetic weakening and is being
bought for \$28.

J. M. McLeod & Sons will load their
last carload of sheep and lambs on
Wednesday next week, and farmers
desiring to clean up should take note.
They shipped their third carload of
poultry this week. For five hens and
chickens 20 cents was paid; for ducks
22; geese, 25; and turkeys 30. For
dressed poultry they pay: Poultry, 25;
chickens, 30; ducks, 32; geese, 35;
turkeys, 45. Dressed pork 18; beef 8
and 9; butter 50; eggs 60.

Hartland Red Cross Still Active

The Canadian Red Cross Society is
endeavoring to raise funds to assist
the work of the British Empire War
Relief. It is hoped to raise \$30,000
in New Brunswick. At a meeting of
Hartland Red Cross held at the home
of Mrs. H. E. Adams on Tuesday af-
ternoon it was decided to contribute
\$125 of the funds in hand to help
along the work. The local Red Cross
Societies have been asked to contrib-
ute Christmas stockings for the in-
valid soldiers in the hospitals at River
Glade, St. John and Fredericton.
Hartland Red Cross has appointed
collectors to raise money for this pur-
pose and they will call around soon.

Many may think the local Red
Cross is not now in existence, but it
is, and will be kept going to assist
the many sufferers who are still in
hospitals and the many other calls
for assistance the society receives.
All members should pay up their
dues. Collectors will receive them.

VICTORIA COUNTY COURT

The November session of the Vic-
toria County Court opened at And-
over on Tuesday before Judge Carleton.
No civil cases were before the court.
Two criminal cases, the King vs. Gagne,
and the King vs. Watson, were sub-
mitted to the grand jury. Both of these
cases were for charges of assault oc-
casioning actual bodily harm. In
each case no bill was found and the
cases were dismissed.

A young man from Cape Breton,
who pleaded guilty to a charge of
theft of money, was sentenced to

serve two years in Dorchester peni-
tentiary. Fines were imposed on a
number of grand and petit jurymen
who failed to attend. Alex Straton,
clerk of the court, acted for the Crown
and J. M. Keefe of Grand Falls ap-
peared for the defence in the case of
the King vs. Gagne.

NOVEMBER MEETING METHODIST DISTRICT

Resolution to Ask Government for
Change in Vendors System

The November District meeting of
the Woodstock District of the Meth-
odist Church met in Hartland Meth-
odist church on Tuesday. All the min-
isters in the active work within the
district were present as follows: Rev.
F. A. Wightman, East Florenceville,
(chairman); Rev. M. E. Conron, Wood-
stock; Rev. H. Harrison, Jackson
ville; Rev. W. J. Donville, Debec;
Rev. George Readman, Canterbury;
Rev. F. S. Crisp, Lindsay; Rev. Hugh
Miller, Contreville, and Rev. Chas.
Flemington, Andover. Owing to the
busy season few lay delegates were
in attendance.

In the afternoon a devotional hour
led by the chairman proved most help-
ful and inspiring. This was followed
by the despatch of routine matters.
In this connection a report of the pro-
gress of the Forward Movement
showed the Woodstock district to lead
all other districts of the conference in
per centage of money forwarded to
the treasurer.

This was followed by the most ex-
cellent papers read by Rev. Chas.
Flemington, W. J. Donville and Hugh
Miller. They dealt, respectively, with
"Intercession in Evangelistic Work,"
"Cooperation in Evangelistic Work,"
and "Christian Stewardship." Each
was in turn discussed, and altogether
the session was most helpful and in-
spiring.

In the evening a good congregation
was in attendance. The opening ex-
ercises were conducted by the Pastor,
Rev. J. K. King, a full choir furnishing
excellent music. The chairman then
took charge and the following resolu-
tion was presented and unanimously
carried: Moved by Rev. M. E. Conron
M. A. and seconded by Rev. Hugh
Miller—"We in District meeting as-
sembled, representing the Methodist
people of Carleton and Victoria coun-
ties, hereby request the Provincial
Government to so change its system of
Vendorship of Intoxicating Liquor, re-
moving it from the druggists and plac-
ing its sale in the hands of some re-
sponsible person for each town or dis-
trict who shall not be engaged in any
business which might make more dif-
ficult the strict enforcement of the
present prohibition law throughout
the province."

An interesting program of addresses
and music followed. Rev. H. Harri-
son spoke on "The Value of the
Church to the Community." Rev. F.
A. Wightman on "Local Evangelism
and The Local Church," and Rev. M.
E. Conron on "Evangelism the Primal
Objective of the Church."

The thanks of the district was ex-
tended to the pastor and the people
for this kind entertainment of the de-
legates. It was also decided to hold
the March meeting at Debec on the
kind invitation of Rev. Mr. Donville.
An appropriate hymn and the bene-
diction by Rev. H. Harrison brought to
a close one of the most successful
meetings of the Woodstock district.
