SHAREHOLDERS CAN EXCHANGE STOCK

Proposals Made by the British Empire Steel Corporation to Holders of Old Stocks

(By Canadian Associated Press.)
 Montreal, May 4.—Included in the proposals made by the directors of the British Empire Steel Corporation to the companies included in the merger are the following terms on which present preferred shareholders will be given the option of exchanging their stock holdings:

Dominion Steel Corporation, six per cent. preferred, of which \$7,000,000 is outstanding, will be exchangeable share for share at the rate of 7 per cent. cumulative preference stock of the corporation.

Canada S. S. Lines, 7 per cent. preferred, of which \$22,500,000 is outstanding, will be exchangeable share for share at the rate of 7 per cent. cumulative preference stock of the corporation.

Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Company, 8 per cent. preferred, of which there is outstanding only \$3,000,000, will be exchangeable on the basis of \$120 in British Empire Steel 7 per cent. cumulative preference stock for each share presently held.

THE GOULD ACTION HEARD IN COURT

Gould Claims That He and His Associates Were Illegally Driven From Company

St. John, May 4.—Argument was heard on Saturday by Sir Douglas Hailey, chief justice, on the application of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company to dismiss an action which, it is alleged, has been brought in the name of the company without authority. The action was entered at the instance of A. E. Gould and certain associates of his, formerly shareholders and directors of the company, who claim to be still directors and shareholders, and the defendants in the case are the present directors of the company.

Mr. Gould's solicitor has entered the action with the St. John & Quebec Railway Company as the plaintiff and W. P. Jones, E. S. Carter and C. O. Foss as defendants, and the relief asked for is to restrain the defendants from acting as directors.

The real point at issue is as to the legality of the statute of 1915 and the order-in-council passed by the government of which the late Gen. J. Clarke was Premier, by which Mr. Gould and his associates were deprived of their offices as directors and the capital stock of the company was taken over by them vested in the province.

Mr. Gould claims that the legislation was ultra vires of the province because it took away from him and his associates, who were then residing outside the province, a civil right owned by them outside the province, and also that the province had then no authority to legislate in respect to the St. John & Quebec Railway for the reason that, being operated by the Dominion, it had been impliedly declared by the Dominion to be a work for the general advantage of Canada and therefore under Dominion jurisdiction.

J. E. F. Windsor, of Fredericton, and R. G. Todd, K.C., represented the Gould interests; P. J. Hughes, of Fredericton, and W. P. Jones, K.C., of Woodstock, appeared for the Province and the Dominion. Judgment was reserved.

VOTING HOURS IN NEW FRANCHISE ACT

Quebec, May 2.—Hours of voting in Federal elections, under the new Franchise Bill, came in for much discussion at this evening's session of the Commons. Barred members, for the most part, were against opening the voting polls at 6 o'clock, the time provided in the bill. Hon. Hugh Parry, Solicitor General, agreed to an amendment which would open the polls at 6 o'clock and rural polls at 8 o'clock. In such case the hour of closing would be 6 o'clock in the evening. "The farmers have won again," remarked C. G. Power (Quebec South) when the Minister moved his amendment.
