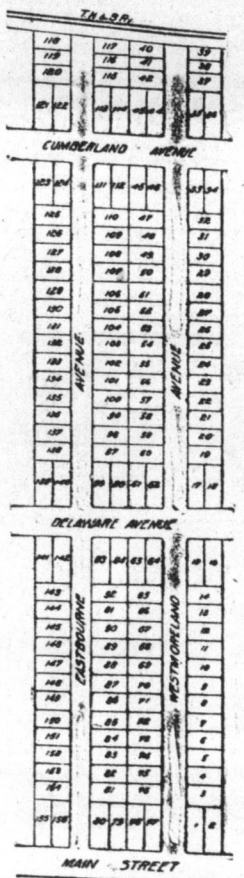

TORONTO MARKETS
Live Stock.
Receipts of live stock at the city market as reported by the railways, were 105 carloads, composed of 1,514 cattle, 2,205 hogs, 879 sheep, 679 calves and 1 horse.
Export steers are worth from \$6 to \$6.50; export bulls, \$4.75 to \$5.25. Butchers.—Prime picked butchers sold at \$5.25 to \$6; loads of good, \$5.50 to \$5.80; medium, \$5.15 to \$5.50; common, \$4.75 to \$5.10; cows, \$3 to \$4.75; can- ners, \$1.50 to \$2.50 per cow.
Feeders and Stockers.—About 2 loads of stockers all sold were on sale and these weighed from 500 to 700, and were bought by Messrs. H. and W. Murby at \$3.30 to \$3.75 per cwt. Mr. Murby re- ports a moderate demand for both stockers and feeders.
Miners and Springers.—There was a fair trade in miners and springers, but no extraordinary prices were reported. Quotations for cows ranged from \$30 to \$52 each.

From official and private estimates it is clear that crops will be very large this fall, and there has been some good outlook. The special feature of the market, both in active and relative issues, is the scarcity of offerings. Some low priced stocks have recently opened up rather sharply, for no particular reason, except this scarcity, and any attempt to buy in quantity would apparently produce sub- stantial betterment. Buying of R. G. and Steel was of good quality. Atten- tion is called to the scarcity of Mo. T. current price. The annual report of Brooklyn Union Gas construes an in- dication of good earnings by Con. Gas. In- siders look for a favorable support of the market. Dividend on the new stock capitalization of American Steel Foundry are forthcoming. The trend of sentiment is favorable to prices.—Emms & Stoppani.
