SPIRITUALISM

A generation ago, in the country schools of Scotland the children had to bring with them each morning "one peat," which was to help to make the school fire. All over Scotland and in some parts of Ireland the farmers even to-day burn nothing but peat, which they dig out of a bog or mossy tract of country.

A new use, however, has been found for peat. In Sweden they have begun to convert it into paper. It is claimed that only two hours is required to make peat into paper.

This is only another example of the fact that unpromising materials can be turned into good uses. Even if only the coarse grades of paper can be made from this material it ought to save the wood pulp a great deal.
