Recent Inventions. PATENTS GRANTED FOR NEW AND USEFUL DEVICES.

The United States Patent Office has been unusually busy granting patents to inventors for new and useful inventions. Some of them are as follows: A machine for plucking geese or beating the hair off hides or furs. Clamp for overshoes so as they will not slip up and down on the heel of the shoe. A very valuable device for the newspapers, consisting of a gallery so arranged that the printer can put late news on his press, using the rotary cylinder for the purpose. A very handy little opener for envelopes, shaped very much like a tin can opener, to run along the edge of an envelope, and warranted not to miss when the end is started rightly.

The making of cigars by machine is facilitated considerably by a device for bunching or filling, something the cigar maker has tried a long while to accomplish. Quite a novelty for boiling eggs, so arranged with an alarm so to ring a bell so long on a wire when the egg is wanted soft the bell vibrates a little, and when the egg is wanted to be boiled hard the bell is set in motion steadily. The Philippine War.

MANILA, Dec. 14.—A detachment of Colonel Hayes' cavalry, under Lieut. Arnold, had captured Bacanabaldo, the mountain stronghold where the last insurrection was ended with a peace treaty. A large quantity of munitions of war was secured. Major Bacanabaldo's battalion of the 24th infantry, is making slow progress in the Aparri valley. The villagers are giving the colored troops banquets and calls everywhere.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Gen. Otis had some stirring news to report today from Manila, his advice going to show that the insurgents are, as he predicted a few days ago, at the end of their resources from a military point of view, and are melting away before the rapid advance of the American troops at all points. His cablegrams were as follows:

MANILA, Dec. 12.—Fifty men of the navy and fifty men of the army transported by the navy, took Laog on the 10th inst. General Young, with staff followed next day. He reports Hosi with Penn's battalion of the 34th followed by a portion of the 23d infantry, passed north to Pidding, east of Laog March's battalion of the 34th was at Cayan on the 7th inst. The 3rd Cavalry was along the coast and in the mountain pursuing his enemy.

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Young states his extreme northern force passed over mountains, driving the insurgents under General Tiao, who was badly wounded, killing fifty and wounding many. He made a large capture of rifles and property, with all insurgent transportation, and released all the Spanish prisoners in the vicinity to the number of about 2,000. Our casualties were two wounded. Our troops are still pursuing the remnant of Tiao's command. March reports from Cayan on the 7th inst. that he has destroyed Aguinaldo's body-guard, killed General Gregorio Pillar, received the surrender of General Concepcion and staff, killed and wounded 52 in surges released five hundred and seventy-five Spanish prisoners, including one hundred and fifty friars and captured considerable property. His loss was two killed and nine wounded. My information is that Aguinaldo has disguised his individuality, abandoned his troops and is hiding in the province of Bangue.

General Otis's second despatch is as follows:

MANILA, Dec. 13.—Admiral Watson informs me that the province of Cagayan surrendered unconditionally to Captain McCalla, of the Ne-ark, on the 11th inst. all arms being surrendered. This surrender doubtless includes the province of Isabela. General Bates, at Zamboanga reports the situation there satisfactory. McArthur at Bayambang reports he holds a prisoner of war Mabini, the ablest of the insurgents and founder of the late government.

"Hurry up then, please. It hurts my face."

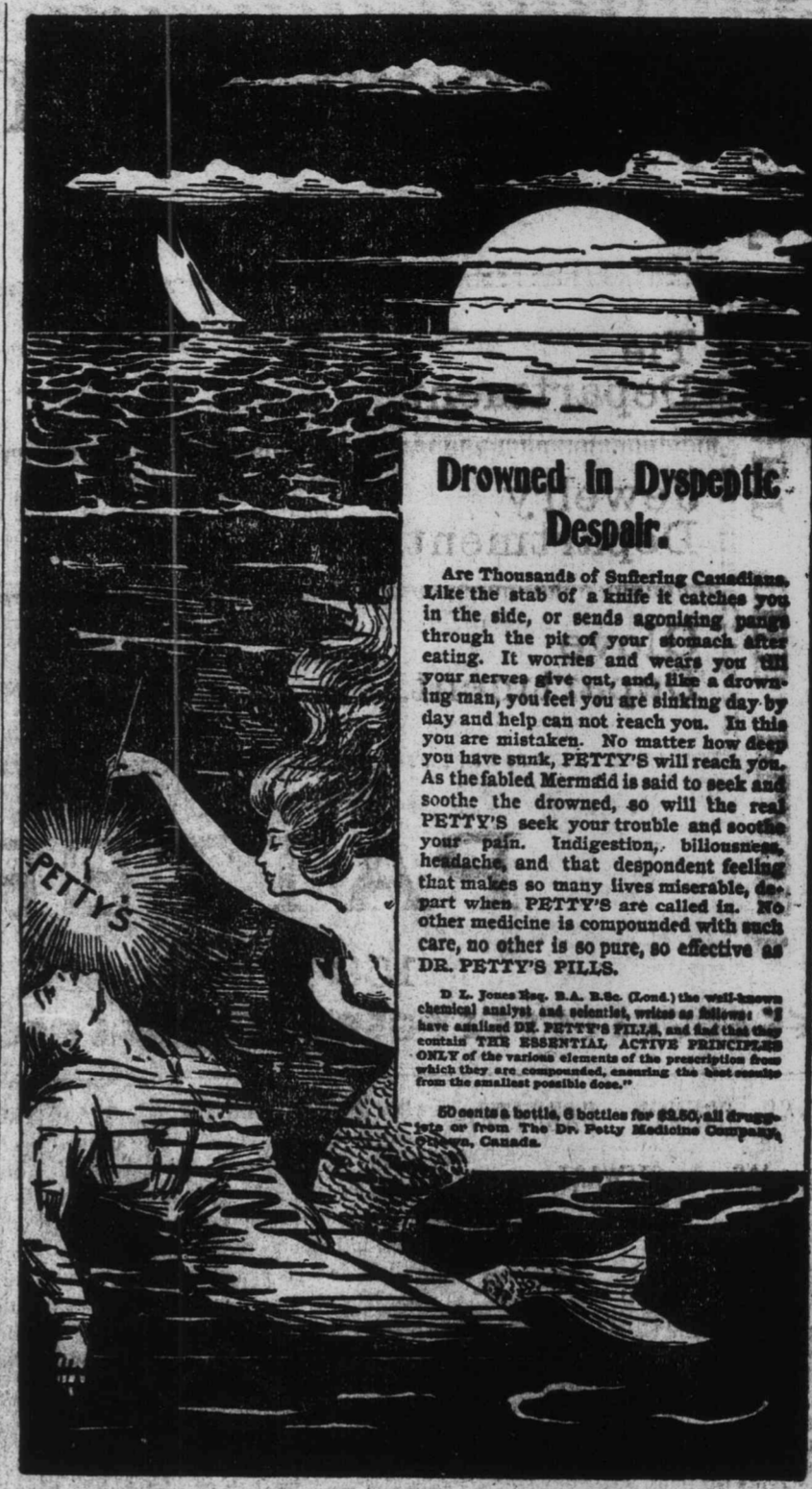
