

Secretary of State Evans has invited the cooperation of the Governments of Great Britain, Germany, Norway, Sweden and Denmark to assist in the task of suppressing piracy in the United States, by warning seamen that the practice will not be permitted in Utah. It is manifest that the British Government, for example, cannot deprive a man of his liberty unless he has violated an English law. The whole question is surrounded with difficulties. If a British subject goes to British India and adopts one of the creeds of the natives, he may marry a plurality of wives and live with them in India. The same is true if he goes to Turkey, Morocco, or any other country where polygamy is legal. The fact that it is prohibited in England would not make it legal for the Government to detain in the country a subject of the Queen because he has polygamous intentions. And how should these intentions be known? The fact that a man believes in polygamy does not necessarily prove that he will marry at all, much less that he will take to himself more than one wife. As regards women, their case is even more difficult. The Mormon creed does not allow a female adherent to be married to more than one husband at the same time, and she is not permitted to marry again until her first husband, "intention" of such unmarried Mormon women emigrating to this country is presumed to become the best wife, if she cannot be the only wife of her prospective husband, and in this there is nothing criminal.

The attention of English tenant farmers is being directed to Canada as an emigration field. The Liverpool Courier points out that there were openings in the country for English farmers had anticipated the coming of emigrants to the Dominion. The tide of emigration has not been very strong so far, but there are abundant signs that the exodus now inaugurated will greatly increase in volume. A tone of confidence is reported among the emigrants themselves. There is every prospect of considerable proportion of the English tenant farmers who will leave the shores of the mother country will settle in the Dominion, and assist in its agricultural developments.

The likeness was excellent, and the nine tails were supposed to represent war, slavery, bankruptcy, imperialism, and other evils which have been associated with the policy of the present Government. The drawing was in its way quite a work of art.
