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

FINE BOUTS FEATURE THE G.W.V.A. SHOW

Jack Loney Shades Indian Pete Scott in a Fast Ten Round go—Patsy Mayo Sprises Fans.

Fully five hundred fight fans were in attendance at the Armory last night when the best set of bouts yet staged by the War Veterans were put on and the crowd were given plenty of action for their money throughout the evening.

That the number present would have been greatly increased if there had been no counter attraction goes without saying but the burnt cork men who were holding forth at the Grand enticed away a number of ardent lovers of the padded gloves.

But those who did put in an appearance were well rewarded as the last three bouts had them on their toes throughout.

A ST. KITT'S NIGHT.

Taken from all angles it was truly a St. Catharines night for Jack Loney had a shade the better of Indian Pete Scott of Hamilton in the main bout, while Patsy Mayo who also gets his mail through the local post office had a slight edge on Willie Hewitt of Buffalo. As a result the big crowd did plenty of cheering for the home town battlers and everyone went home thoroughly satisfied.

The first bout which brought together Dick Hyland of Erie, Pa., and Johnnie Fasane of Geneva, N. Y., was scheduled to go four rounds but after Hyland walloped Fasane around the ring in the first session he finished him off early in the second with a ticket via the "Dreamland Line."

A GOOD BOY.

Patsy Mayo proved a comer when he shaded Willie Hewitt in the second bout. Although the fight went the full four rounds, the local boy had the best of it in three of them. He is a rangy built youngster with a wallop in both hands and gave his more experienced opponent a merry battle. He should improve greatly after a couple more fights and should make a name for himself.

The semi-final bout of six rounds brought together Cy Martin and Young Davis, both of Buffalo, and it was a slam bang affair from the first gong.

Both boys weighed in at 122 pounds and stood toe to toe and swapped punches throughout. Just who is the better boy is a toss up and it is a sure bet that the fans would welcome another go between them over a ten round route as they provided one of the best exhibitions of fighting ever seen here in a long time.

It was a real good bout and both lads came in for a lot of praise from the fans.

THE MAIN BOUT.

The feature bout, which was between Jack Loney of this city and Pete Scott, the Hamilton Indian, drew plenty of applause from the fans and the consensus of opinion was that the local boy won on points.

Loney entered the ring with about fifteen pounds the best of it in weight and he used it to advantage against Scott who is perhaps the cleverest boxer of the two.

The first round was tame, both men feeling for an opening. The second was slightly in Loney's favor with the third he sent his left to Scott's kidneys and right to the head and repeated the dose as the gong rang.

The fourth was even, both men working hard. Loney slammed a right to the face and Scott came back with a wicked uppercut. The fifth was a repetition of the fourth while in the sixth Loney had the advantage at first but Scott came back strong at the end drawing the claret with a left jab to the nose.

A FAST FINISH.

The next round was about even but the eighth was a fast and furious session which brought the fans to their feet. Loney sent left and right to the head and time after time Scott's cleverness saved him from severe punishment.

Loney hooked a right to Scott's eye, splitting it open, but the Ambitious City boy came back with a straight left to Loney's nasal organ and the claret flowed freely.

Loney had a good margin in the ninth but the last round Scott came back and the fur flew throughout the session and although he took a lot of punishment he gave some back with interest and both men were going strong when the final gong

sounded.
It was a fine evening's sport and the Veteran's match-maker deserves a barrel of praise for the splendid programme he provided.
Dick Nugent was the third man in the ring.

SENATOR LOUGHEED ON COPYRIGHT

In introducing in the Senate the Government Bill on Copyright, Senator Lougheed said:

"The Bill establishes a uniform period of copyright protection consisting of the life of the author and a period of fifty years after his death. It also extends copyright protection to records, perforated rolls, cinematograph films or other contrivances by means of which a work can be mechanically formed or delivered. 
