THE STAND COLLAPSED.

A temporary grand stand at 68th street and Stewart avenue Chicago built for the purpose of accommodating an audience to witness the annual field day sports of the Chicago Normal schools, collapsed on Saturday, 25 per cent, mostly women and children, being injured. Several were hurt seriously but it is thought none will die. The stand, which was 100 feet long and seven tiers high was crowded.
