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The Latest Cyclone.

Clinton, Ill., May 19.—A cyclene in this vicinity last night did immense damage. On the line of the Salt Creek many he uses were detroyed. Six miles south of Clinton the wind tore down a house, killing Peter Clifton, his wife and an eight year old daughter, and fatally injuring another child. A family named Bennison were injured seriously. other families were more or less injured.

A FATAL RAILROAD ACCIDENT. St. Louis, May 19.—Last night's train on the Indianapolis & St. Louis Railroad when nearing Hillsboro, Ill., sixty miles from here, met with a fatal accident. The tridge across a small stream was blown down by the storm, and in the darkness and rain the trair cashed into the gap, precipitating the engine and baggage car into the stream. Pat Welch, engineer, was instantly killed. Dan Harrington, fireman, was very seriously injuree. No passengers were hurt THE DISASTER AT RACINE.

Racine, Wis, May 19.—The scene all along the course of the cyclone is pitiful ind heartrending in the extreme, It was not generally known until this morning that Racine had suffered a calamity without a parallel in its history. The scene among the dead, wounded and dying was one painful beyond description. In many instances surviving relatives had lost all semblance of reason. Physicians are not numerous enough to give prompt assistance, and numerous bleeding victims were rolled up in blan-kets, while anxious relatives ran in every direction to secure medicine and aid. An investigation this morning only serves to to swell the lists of causalties

and make more sweeping the destruction caused by the cyclone last night. It is estimated that twenty-five were killed and one hundred injured. One hundred and fifty houses were demolished, and had the cyclone struck the business cen-tre the damage would not easily have een calculated. THE LOSS OF LIFE IN ILLINOIS.
