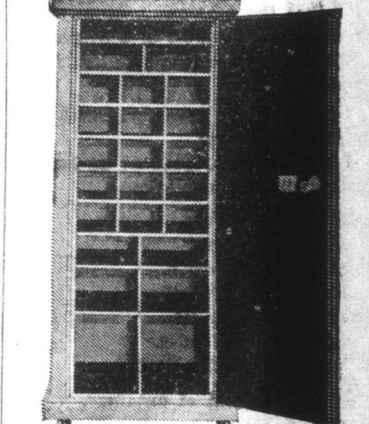

LONDON, July 14. The Daily Graphic, alluding to proposed modifications in the Anglo-Japanese Alliance, thinks that it will come as a shock to the average Englishman to learn that by the Treaty of Commerce Japan is bound to join Japan in the event of her being involved in war with the United States. It is true, the Graphic adds, that the text of the treaty clearly contemplates this contingency, but no one hitherto has had courage to avow it in so many words. Under whatever circumstances of war between Japan and the United States, it would be profoundly distasteful to the English-speaking people to find themselves fighting their American kinsmen in the cause of another race.

ROME, July 14. The Pope, in view of the increased cost of living, has issued an encyclical to Catholics with the object of helping the working and salaried classes. The Pope has decided to abolish the obligation to hear Mass on the days dedicated to St. Joseph and St. John, and on Corpus Domini day, which henceforth will be solemnized on the nearest Sunday. Roman Catholics must continue to attend Mass on Sundays, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Twelfth Day, Ascension Day, All Saints Day, the Feast of the Conception, St. Peter and St. Paul's Day. If any such feasts fall on Fast days, a dispensation from fasting will be granted.

WASHINGTON, July 14. An agreement to vote on the Reciprocity Bill on Saturday next, July 22nd, was reached by the Senate today. The agreement fixes the vote on the House Wool Revision Bill for July 28th; Free List Bill, Aug. 1st; Reapportionment Bill, August 2nd; Statehood Bill, August 7th. It is expected that the adjournment of Congress will immediately follow the Statehood vote.

League Football.

Collegians Defeat Feldians.

The Feldians and Collegians met in the League football match on St. George's Field last evening, the latter defeating the former by 3 goals to 1. The weather was calm, and about 15 minutes after the game started a thick fog settled down over the field, and the remark of a wag seemed to be pertinent to conditions when he said that "The players required a pocket compass to steer for the ball." The Collegians played the western goal and soon after the kick off took the ball up field by Feldians when Dickenson, getting a run, scored first blood for his team. For several minutes afterwards the Feldians were on their opponents' goal, and then getting east the Collegians were awarded a penalty kick for hands off. The ball was swiftly sent goalwards by Quick, but to the amazement of all, Lush, the goaltender, saved well and the applause accorded was well deserved. Here let us remark that Lush gave the best exhibition of goalkeeping seen at any match for several seasons past. Shot after shot some of them swift and very difficult, were sent him all through the match, but nothing got past him, and he has become famous as a goalkeeper. Soon after the Feldians scored, the Collegians got down field and Fenwick put in the equalizer. For some time after the Collegians bombarded the Feldian goal, but the goaltender and backs were invincible, when Quick, who undoubtedly justifies his name, banged in No. 2 for Collegians. It was now give and take between the two teams. Some fine shots, notably one by Ayre from midfield, were made and saved by Lush and the backs. Fouls, hands and off-sides were repeatedly given against men on both teams, but no further scoring occurred and the half concluded—Collegians, 2 goals; Feldians, 1.

SECOND HALF. This half started by hands being given against Fenwick, and it was marked by some fast play for a while by Feldians, who had Butler in goal busy for a while. Collegians now retaliated and had several shots at the Feldian goal, which Lush as usual met in brilliant style. Then Quick took control of the ball, rushed up the wing, and getting past the Feldian backs, scored No. 3 for Collegians amidst prolonged applause. The fight was fast and furious after this, but nothing further resulted in the shape of scoring, and the game closed—Collegians, 3 goals; Feldians, 1. Referee—Mr. W. J. Higgins.
