Mr. S. B. Kesner's Contradiction.

Editor Evening Telegram.
In your issue of Tuesday last you stated in an item under the head of "Police Make a Seizure," that Head Constable Dawe had made a seizure of four barrels of old brass and other odds of metals on my premises, and that same were taken to the Police Station. The item also stated that the metal was identified as having been taken from the Reid Nfd. Co., and from Telegraph Company. The item is untrue and misleading and if contradicted may have a detrimental effect upon my character as well as my business. The following are the facts. In the course of my business my agent purchased some old brass from zinc which had been thrown out by either the Reid Nfd. Co., or the Telegraph Co.—but not brass or copper. Head Constable Dawe entered my store on Tuesday morning and having examined my books (without a magistrate's authority as required by law), he went to the store and also without any authority improperly ordered my foreman, Mr. T. Kennedy, not to leave the premises and kept him there practically under arrest for three hours. The Head Constable then took away with him about two hundred pounds of old useless zinc. No old brass or old copper was taken, not even four ounces, not to speak of four barrels.

My instructions to my foreman are very positive and he is not permitted to purchase any article if he has the slightest suspicion that same have been stolen. The Head Constable has a fear been a little too officious in this matter and it is quite possible my Solicitor will deal with him later on. Other constables have visited my place from time to time and they never thought of regarding the old rubbish, such as Dawe seized, as being goods likely to be stolen by anybody.
