

A Fortnight's Response

A fortnight ago to-day the first subscription list of the Newfoundland Aeroplane Fund was published. It amounted to \$1,500. To-day the subscriptions amount to nearly \$22,000 without counting the cheque for \$7, 500 sent in by the Messrs. Reid to buy the ordinary type of machine used by the military. It will appear that there is almost enough in hand to purchase two more of the powerful type, which are able to carry greater weight and dinary machines. This will enable chines all told, two large and one small and by the time the list closes on August 4th, there will be a good round sum in hand as a balance which will be used to start a Machine Gun Subscription. Many people consider we should emulate Canada in providing a number of such guns. We should aim at providing 30 of them. The cost would be about \$20,000. The Government is providing six. Mr. W. D. Reid provided two which unfortunately are of the Colt Type, too delicate in construction for the rough and tumble of trench-work, though superior in the number of cartridges discharged per minute. Grand Falls aims at supplying two, and Bell Island hopes that part of the subsciption from there will be devoted to machine guns. It is expected that the subscription from Bell Island will allow of at least two more being provided. Sir Edgar Bowring and his firms will provide two more.
