A Hundred and Fifty Years.

"The old order changeth, yielding place to new,
And God fulfills Himself in many ways."



In the diary of Frances Burney, which I was reading the other day, I came across this significant passage: "He advances many bold and singular opinions" (she was writing a book "The Vicar of Wakefield," which she had in a "read"; for example, he avers that murder is the sole crime for which death ought to be the punishment; he goes even further, and ventures to affirm that our laws in regard to punishment are all too severe."

Frances Burney wrote that in 1768, only a century and a half ago.

Yet she was ahead of her time. She herself was an original and advanced thinker, and yet the idea that theft and many other minor crimes should not be punished by hanging was "a bold and singular opinion" to her.

To the ordinary person of that day it would probably have seemed even more revolutionary and impracticable. What would Fanny's contemporaries have thought of a land where not even murder was punished by death?

What would they have thought of a time when prisons should be regarded by right-thinking people not as instruments of punishment but of regeneration?

What would they have thought of Judge Lindsey's or Thomas Osborne's trust in criminals? "You Can't Change Human Nature," if anyone had described such a

time and such a land, they would have said, "You are talking about Utopia. Such a thing could never come to pass. You would have to change human nature and that can't be done." The spirit of these same people is living to-day. It says there will always have to be hideous poverty and wanton luxury side by side. It says men will never discover a solution for a condition of affairs where some die of hunger while others die of over-eating. It says the world is essentially what it was a thousand years ago and will be essentially the same a thousand years hence. And it lies. And such a passage as this shows up the lie.

Suppose We Move As Far In A Hundred and Fifty Years. A hundred and fifty years ago Frances Burney, a woman of education, probably fifty years ahead of her age, thought it a singular opinion to believe that murder was the only crime that should be punished by death.

To-day, not only does the average man accept that, but many men do not think we have a right to take life even in retribution for the taking of life.

Why, then, is it not possible that some of the schemes that the average man calls visionary to-day may become the matter of course of a century and a half from now?

To my mind it is possible—and more.

The Bishop of Newfoundland at Sandy Point.

Special to Evening Telegram. ST. GEORGE'S, Aug. 28. On the 25th inst. the Bishop left St. John's en route for St. George's, arriving there at 9 o'clock the following evening. He was met at the station by the Rector of the Parish and many influential citizens. The Bishop and Chaplain were entertained by Mrs. Butler in the historic Rectory at Sandy Point, which presented a very beautiful and striking effect by the illumination in every house. A salvo of guns gave a roaring welcome to our prelate. The Bishop and Chaplain were entertained by Mrs. Butler in the historic Rectory at Sandy Point, and the evening being late, the sheets put an end to a long and full day. Sunday, the tenth after Trinity, will be long remembered by the Church people at Sandy Point. The services of the day began with a Celebration of the Holy Communion, the Bishop being celebrant, assisted by the Rector. Matins were at 11. The Bishop preached a most eloquent and inspiring sermon upon matters concerning the parish of St. George, the Diocese of Newfoundland and the Empire to which we belong. The beautiful church of St. Stephen, replacing the old one, was referred to by the Bishop as one of the finest Sanctuaries of the Lord in the whole diocese. He congratulated the congregation upon their energy, enthusiasm and self-denial in bringing to a successful accomplishment work which they had started three years before, showing the marvellous recuperative power of this thriving settlement, the oldest in the Bay. In the afternoon candidates from Sandy Point and St. George's received the apostolic rite of the laying on of hands. The Bishop, in his address laid great emphasis on the two-fold nature of this Sacrament, first the ancient custom of the Catholic Church in presenting her young members to the Chief Pastor, and secondly the gift of God imparted to her faithful for the strengthening of their hearts and souls to successfully combat the world, the flesh and the devil and thus be loyal and true servants of the Lord.
