There has always been, in the Dominion, a sort of standing invitation to Newfoundland to come in and thereby "round-off Confederation." When the British North America Act was drawn up, the possibility of the entry of Newfoundland was in the minds of Canadian statesmen, and provision was made for it in the Act itself: it is there to-day. The disposition in this country toward the absorption of Newfoundland has been, in a general way, favorable. This attitude has not. however. been reciprocated in Newfoundland, except at times when it has appeared that the island people doubted their ability to get along alone.
