### Training the Blind.

Whilst the ultimate aims of the proposed institution for the blind as set forward by Major Howley in his fourth article, may seem somewhat ambitious, there seems no reason to doubt that the project will be successful if it meets with the support that it undoubtedly merits. There are a very large number of blind in this country and those who received any training had to go to Halifax for it. Those not so fortunate were left, a burden on the community, forced to accept poor relief through no fault of their own. Whilst there is probably no greater physical handicap than lack of sight, nevertheless certain faculties are left whereby those so afflicted may, to some extent, contribute to their own support. An institution, such as Major Howley suggests, would be an untold benefit to the country and particularly to the blind, none of whom desire to accept charity if it can possibly be avoided. Until a building can be erected especially for the purpose, Waterford Hall will make an ideal temporary institution for the blind, and it is satisfactory to note that before very long it will be ready to receive thirty adult male blind who will be trained in such subjects as are found to be suitable for them. Although these students will at first be housed and boarded free, as their training progresses they will be able to put it to practical use and will to some extent, if not altogether, be able to pay for their keep. Whilst too much cannot be expected at once, yet it is something to know that a start in the direction of a blind institution has been made, and it is to be hoped that before very long the entire project outlined by Major Howley, will be an accomplished fact.

### Thieves at Work.

Farmers are complaining that their fields are being raided and root crops stolen. In the vicinity of Long Pond there seems to be an epidemic, and even the loss through crops destroyed during the raids which usually takes place after dark, amounts to a considerable sum. It is not an unusual thing for a farmer to find on going to his field in the morning that some person had hauled the stalks of what would produce a half barrel of potatoes. Cabbage and turnips, too, are not safe from the thieves; of course in the case of the latter, the usual "sting" by the small boy is to be accounted as an additional loss. A well known gentleman who takes a deep interest in agriculture, informed the Telegram that on Friday night some thief entered his field and dug up a patch of potatoes which he was growing as an experiment. The provoking element to him is not the loss of so much potatoes, but that the seed were of a special variety that he had secured while on a visit to Canada this spring, and that of a field in which some seventy or eighty barrels are grown, these potatoes were the ones that should be stolen. A farm not far distant was for the third time this season, raided, and about a quarter barrel of potatoes stolen besides a large quantity destroyed. The owner is now on the watch and hopes to make a capture.

### C. C. C. Promenade Band Concert To-Night.

The C.C.C. Band will hold their first indoor Promenade Band Concert in the Prince's Rink to-night at 8.15. The Band have secured from the Rink Management two nights per week: Mondays and Fridays (the other nights being devoted to Roller Skating) and should the concert prove successful the Band will continue them during the fall. The admission fee to the rink will be 10c, and a small fee will be charged for admission to the floor for each dance item. During the last few days a staff of carpenters have been putting the floor in condition, and everything will be in good order for to-night's event.

### "Moonshiners" Fined.

Residents of Paradise in Court. A resident of Paradise was charged before Judge Morris this morning with having "moonshine" in his possession. Head Constable Byrne told how he had found the liquor on the defendant when, in company with other members of the force, he stopped him on the road during the past week. The defendant had had the liquor in a bag under his arm. In passing sentence His Honor said that he did not know that "moonshine" had got as far as Paradise. The defendant was fined \$100 or 30 days.

Another resident of Paradise was also charged with having "moonshine" in his possession. Head Constable Byrne stated that he had found several bottles of local made liquor in the defendant's house. A still had also been discovered. Detective Sergeant Simmonds and Constable Lee gave similar evidence.

Mr. T. P. Halley, for the defence, put the accused in the box. The witness declared that he had not manufactured the liquor and had got it only for medicinal purposes.

An able plea on these grounds was put forward by Mr. Halley. His Honor said there was evidently a combine for the sale of this moonshine and he was going to put a stop to it. The accused had deliberately perjured himself in the box. A fine of \$100 or 2 months imprisonment was imposed.

### Fatality at Bell Island.

Ian Hamilton Martin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Martin, of Bell Island, died on Friday last as a result of injuries received through his being caught in some of the apparatus at the Dominion Co.'s pier Haulage Plant. The accident occurred on Thursday, and Ian, who was six years of age, lingered throughout the day in an unconscious state. All efforts to revive him were unsuccessful.

### Told to Get Work.

A man who could have given Goliath an inch or two in height was charged this morning before Judge Morris with begging, vagrancy and frightening citizens. The accused, who had served in the American Army overseas, pleaded for another chance and said he was willing to work. He was discharged with an admonition to get some sort of work which would give him sufficient to pay for his board until he was able to leave the country.

3. For Education, social welfare and similar objects.
4. For permanent national institutions.
5. Economic undertakings in the nature of a permanent investment, national in scope, to include among others:—

- (a) Water conservation and the development of water power.
- (b) Irrigation.
- (c) Afforestation.
- (d) Loans for purposes of public utility, etc.

### Weighing Scales Needed.

A public weighing scales in the East End would fill a long felt want. It has been often but vainly suggested that such a convenience should be erected on the Beach, known also as Haymarket Square. With loads of hay and other produce, farmers are compelled now to go to one of the coal wharves, where often they are obliged to wait a long while, besides having to again get their loads up over the hill. The scales would in addition be very useful for citizens who might wish to check the weight of their purchases. With a small charge the cost of running would be nil, as a weigh master could be secured from one of the nearby stores. It is hoped that the Municipal Council which seems alert on making improvements, will give this matter consideration.

### Successful Operation.

The report of Dr. Garrow and Hamilton justifies in every particular the diagnosis of the case made by Dr. Keegan but a short while ago. It is expected that within about a fortnight Sir John will be able to leave hospital.

### Canada and Newfoundland.

(From the Montreal Gazette.)  
There has always been, in the Dominion, a sort of standing invitation to Newfoundland to come in and there by "round-off Confederation." When the British North America Act was drawn up, the possibility of the entry of Newfoundland was in the minds of Canadian statesmen, and provision was made for it in the Act itself; it is there to-day. The disposition in this country toward the absorption of Newfoundland has been, in a general way, favorable. This attitude has not, however, been reciprocated in Newfoundland, except at times when it has appeared that the island people doubted their ability to get along alone. A desire for Confederation, growing out of a financial depression and having for its immediate object the transfer of public debt from Newfoundland to an enlarged Dominion, is not, perhaps, the happiest foundation for a mutually beneficial union. At present, particularly, Canada has financial problems of its own which seem likely to test, with unusual severity, the resources of the people.
